To Teach at U. of O.



Reginald Coggeshall, sports editor of the Paris edition of the New York Herald, will come to the University of Oregon as professor of journalism next fall, it is announced by Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism. Fresh from nearly five years of active and varied newspaper work, Mr. Coggeshall has been recommended to take the place left vacant by the resignation of Dr. Ralph D. Casey, who has accepted the position of head of the department of journalism at the University of Minnesota.

In addition to his newspaper experience, Mr. Coggeshall has also done some teaching at Harvard and at Tufts university, and is warmly recommended by both educators and practical newspapermen. He graduated from Harvard in 1916, and took advanced work there and at Tufts.

While in Europe, Mr. Coggeshall has travelled extensively, both in connection with his work and while on vacations. He has visited England, Germany, Austria, Hungary, Switzerland, Italy and other countries and has made special studies of their conditions.

COMPETENT AND EXPERIENCED MANAGEMENT ASSURED FOR CHEESE FACTORY

Mr. A. Woodrich and family of Klamath Falls are now occupying the residence owned by Sanford Richardson. At the time of leaving for here, Mr. Woodrich was manager of the Lost River Dairy in Klamath county. M. Woodrich is a native of Switzerland and graduate of the University of Wisconsin. He has been an extensive traveller and close observer of everything pertaining to agricultural activities, and to dairying, creameries and cheese manufacture, in which business he has spent most of his life in the actual manufacture of. His connections have been, almost invariably, with co-operatives in Wisconsin and Idaho, and a few other states. He has had special training and years of manufacturing experience in the manufacturing of butter and cheese, and also particular training in that branch of the business pertaining to the profitable marketing of the output. On the successful marketing of a product largely depends the success of any and every manufactured product. In his years of experience as manager or superintendent of co-operative cheese plants and creameries, not a single failure is recorded. Mr. Woodrich stated that he could not recall a single failure of a co-operative cheese factory or creamery in his native land or this country where absolute co-operation of patrons and management was strictly observed and practiced. Where this harmonious condition prevailed, he stated, there could possibly be no such thing as failure, for the fact that the patrons received every cent of the agreed price of their milk less only the operating expenses under economical management there being no one connected with the industry for the purpose of making a single fortune at the expense of the producers.

Mr. Woodrich will be the cheese maker in the new cheese factory.
