## Students to Take Exam for Foreign Service

University of Oregon, Eugene.—Students in foreign trade at the University of Oregon, as well as others in the state interested in this field, will have an opportunity of taking a written examination for commission to the Foreign service of the United States beginning July 14. It is announced here by Dr. James H. Gilbert, head of the department of economics and dean of the college of liberal arts, who has just received full information on the subject.

Final examinations will be taken either in Seattle or San Francisco, and successful candidates will then go to Washington, D. C., for oral tests in October. Applicants to qualify must be designated by the secretary of state, to whom all interested should apply.

Those successful in winning appointments will enter the expert service established by the government, which has for its purpose the assistance of Americans who have occasion to travel, or who have business abroad.

The University of Oregon offers a number of courses in various

schools and departments designed to fit students for foreign service. A special booklet describing this highly interesting field will be sent on request by the Registrar of the university at Eugene.

## Oregon Writer's Work Meeting With Success

University of Oregon, Eugene.—"Chaffee of Roaring Horse," by Ernest Haycox of Portland, a vigorous novel of the west, is being even more enthusiastically received than "Free Grass," according to reports reaching here. Haycox, who is a graduate of the university, has a host of friends in this part of the state who are keenly interested in his career as a novelist and short story writer.

The success of his second novel, which has been on sale but a few weeks, is rivalled by the fact that the Oregon writer received mention for five of his short stories in the current O. Henry memorial volume. Haycox's popularity as a short story writer is progressing, since he keeps this up even while writing novels.

While the west in general is chosen as a field, Oregon comes in for its share in many of the stories Haycox writes. He is thoroughly familiar with the state, and is particularly well versed on traditions and tales of this part of the country. He is already at work on a third novel, which he promises will portray a new idea in literature of the west.

## Students Organize for Music Work at U. O.

University of Oregon, Eugene.—Creation of a campus-wide committee to stimulate and direct interest in music, and the appointment of Lois Nelson, sophomore, of La Grande, as chairman, was announced recently by Tom Stoddard, president of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon.

Each living organization on the campus will be represented on the committee, which will have for ex-officio members all persons on the faculty of the school of music. It will be the duty of each student to aid in promotion of recitals, concerts and other musical events that are being staged on the campus throughout the year.

The committee has the full approval of Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the university, who is especially interested in music and a development of appreciation for it on the campus.

Miss Nelson has been active in numerous campus projects during her career, and this year has been serving as music reporter and critic for the student daily, and for other publications.
