J. D. Slagle and wife formerly of Willow Springs are now nicely located in their new home at Dodge Bridge.

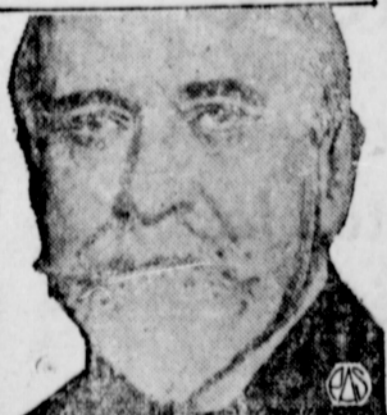
Entertains Visitors

fully set up. They are in grain, cotton, wool and mohair, beans and livestock. Farmer organizations interested in other crops are still at work, under the guidance of the Board, trying to perfect their sales agencies.

Meantime, some farmer groups are deliberately staying out. The Farmers Union is one of those, in spite of the fact that C. E. Huff, president of the Union, is also president of the Farmers National Grain Corporation, the national wheat co-operative under the Farm Board.

There are differences of opinion between the Eastern and Western apple, for one obstacles. 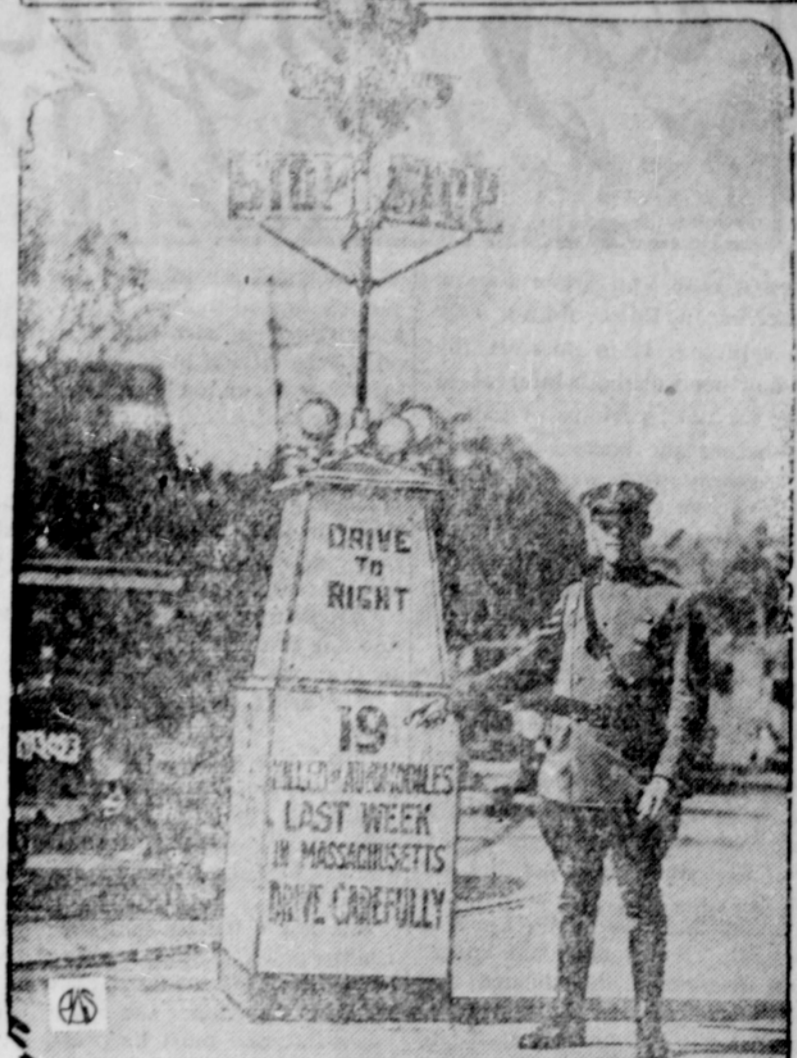

HOME POINTERS

Milk contains all of the proteins that are needed in the body.

In order to utilize or preserve all the minerals and vitamins contained in the liquor of canned vegetables, pour the contents of the can into a skillet and heat rapidly until all liquid is evaporated.

In washing spinach or other greens, if they are lifted out of the water instead of being poured off, none of the sand will remain on the leaves.

In cutting bread or cake, where only a few slices are desired at a time, if they are cut from the cen-

ter and the two remaining portions pushed together, it will not dry out so quickly.

In slicing oranges, if the knife is not sharp enough to cut them easily without spoiling their shape, the peeling may be left on until they are sliced. It can then be removed easily and the slices will be thin and round.

If only clean fresh, sound vegetables and fruit are used in preserving, fewer germs will have a chance to penetrate and the food will be easier to preserve.
