FOUR LOCAL STUDENTS GRADUATE FROM O. S. C.

Bachelor of Science Degrees Awarded to Four Central Point Students

Bachelor of science degrees were awarded to four Central Point students at Oregon State college at the exercises, June 2. Coy Brown was awarded a degree in mechanical engineering 27 and mechanical engineering Pickett in commerce and Echo Schepman in home economics.

These students are among the 489 who were graduated from the 10 degree-granting schools of the institution. The school of commerce leads in the number of graduates with 109. The school of engineering is second with 92 from four departments, industrial arts 12, civil engineering 24, electrical engineering 27 and mechanical engineering 29. Home economics follows with 77, vocational education 68, agriculture 89, pharmacy and pharmaceutical chemistry 30, forestry 21, chemical engineering 18 and mining and mining engineering 7. Twenty eight graduates will receive master's degrees.

Brown has majored in mechanical engineering for which he was awarded a degree of bachelor of science. He is a member of the Beta Kappa social fraternity and of the Associated engineers, an organization for students in the school of engineering. During his last year Brown was president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and a member of the Rowing club.

Hamilton was awarded a degree of bachelor of science in commerce. He has specialized in political science. He is a member of the Tau Delta social fraternity. He has been on the Oregon State Barometer staff for the last three years, climaxing his last year by becoming associate editor.

Pickett was awarded a degree of bachelor of science in commerce. He has specialized in advertising and selling with journalism as his minor subject.

He is a member of the Phi Kappa Tau social fraternity and Sigma Delta Chi national professional journalistic fraternity. Pickett has been prominent on the Barometer staff, advancing from copy-reader in his second year to night editor the third year. In the last year he was managing news editor and associate editor.

He was also on the Oregon State monthly staff as department editor during his junior year and associate editor the last year. During his third year Pickett had the largest amount of printed material of the classes in journalism for which he was awarded the Sigma Delta Chi cup. He was also president of Sigma Delta Chi. National fraternity in journalism, his junior and senior years. Among his varied activities are home-coming publicity manager, Beaver Knight, rook dance committee, Memorial Union drive captain, assistant varsity football manager, Freshman Week News manager, rook bonfire captain and Portland Telegram correspondent.

Miss Schepman was awarded a degree of bachelor of science in home economics.

She has been living in Waldo Hall of which she was elected president in her third year and social chairman the fourth year and social ed hockey for her junior class and was on the Y. W. C. A. council her senior year.

mer." In the face of these reduced market prospects for farm commodities the bureau reports that the mid-season crops are coming along now with prospects of abundant supplies of potatoes, cantaloupes, watermelons, and tomatoes, but probably with limited shipments of peaches, onions and cabbage. Cotton, corn, potatoes and other principal crops have been planted under generally favorable growing conditions and the grass crop has made rapid growth following the late May rains. Some effects of the hard winter, however, are reported to be evident in spotted wheat fields and reduced crops of peaches and some other fruits.

farmers who have incurred indebtedness of him \$1,500 to \$3,000 for the purpose of investing in cows and then have found it possible to wipe out the debt in a surprisingly short time. That says Baker is real farm relief. If you teach a man how to put assets on his farm you are helping him to help himself. Pay him a substantial subsidy and you place a premium on laziness. You haven't helped him and it is almost certain that he will hate you afterwards no matter how good your intentions. No one yet has discovered a substitute for industry in the proper management of a farm. And the boys are coming back to the farms in Steuben County. More than 100 of them who had gone away to the cities in the last few years have returned. That circumstance he regards, as most significant. There is no organized "back to the farm or stay on the farm propaganda. The boys return home because they want to. And hundreds remain at home for the same reason. The explanation of this, most likely is to be found in the attitude of a majority of the county's farmers who are making farm life so attractive for their sons that they have no desire to go away.
