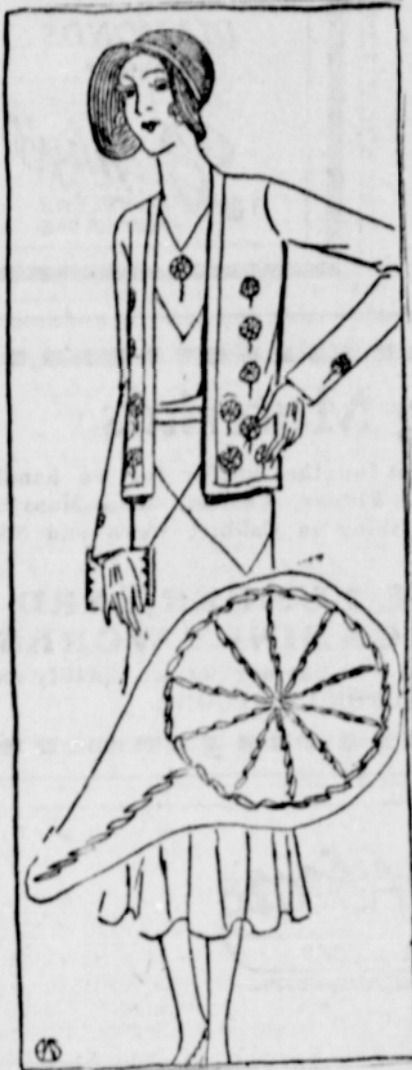

A generation and more ago when the ability to do fine embroidery was considered part of the proper education of every young girl quite as essential as playing the piano and painting china—in those days



that seem so remote, the ordinary outline stitch was held a little in contempt. Little girls when they first began to work with embroidery silk were allowed to follow the lines of the stamping with out line stitch but when they had acquired any sort of proficiency they were expected to fill in petals and leaves with solid satin stitch.

Certainly there is nothing at all difficult about outlining, but from our present point of view it is often more desirable than the more difficult solid embroidery. There are many ways of making use of it in decorating simple summer dresses of lightweight silk or cotton.

The sketch shows a summer costume consisting of sleeveless dress and short jacket of plain natural-colored shantung with embroidery done in a soft light shade brown. This same design may be used to trim little girl's dresses—using the simple motif to form a border near the hem of the skirt repeated on sleeves and front of blouse.

To mark the circle you may use a spool from your work box. Run a long needle through the center of the spool to mark the center of the circle and then mark ten lines from the center to the circumference and a stem at the lower side of the circle. Nothing could be simpler and yet when the design is worked it is most effective.

Mints for the Home

KIDNEY BEANS WITH TOMATOES

Soak one and a half cups of white kidney beans over night. Drain them and boil in water containing a quarter teaspoon of soda. Fry a tablespoon of minced onion in a little dripping. Add two cups of stewed tomatoes, season with a little salt and two level teaspoons of sugar. Barely cover with water and cook in a fireless cooker or double boiler until tender. This should take about three hours.

BEEF and TOMATO PIE

Put meat left over from yesterday's bouillon through the meat chopper. For four cups of the beef you will need a pint of canned tomatoes. Grease a baking dish with bacon fat or good drippings and put in a layer of the tomato with a little onion juice, then a few bread crumbs and then a layer of meat. Continue in this way until near the top and then cover over with fresh mashed potatoes. Brush the potatoes with milk and cook for thirty minutes.

TOMATO TOAST

Two tomatoes, two eggs, one tablespoon butter, one quarter cup of minced ham, a slice of onion, one quarter teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, six rounds of buttered toast. Skin the tomatoes and chop; mince the onion and mix with the meat and tomatoes. Cook them with the butter in a saucepan about ten minutes, remove from the fire, add the beaten eggs, stir over the fire until it sets, then serve on the toast.

YOUR APPETIZER

If you are having chicken for dinner, some sort of tomato appetizer is a good choice. A fruit appetizer precedes lamb or beef very well. A fruit appetizer is also good before veal or pork. Before fish some sort of vegetable appetizer may be served; or an appetizer containing bacon. Sometimes have the appetizer placed at each plate when dinner is announced. In this case, there is no choice. Sometimes have several sorts of appetizers passed in an hors-d'oeuvre dish. Whatever you do, seek variety. It adds a zest to the simplest dinner and takes away from the monotony of a limited selection of meats. Moreover, it is an inexpensive way to give character to the dinner. For a tomato canape and fricassee chicken is a far less expensive proposition than broiled chicken, yet it makes a dinner just as interesting.

To Drill Hole in Rubber

Never try to drill a hole in a hard rubber panel without first providing a starting dent for the drill with a center punch. Without such a punch mark the drill will "walk" all over the panel, no matter how carefully you hold the drill itself.

HOME POINTERS

To insure a flaky product in pastry have all the ingredients cold, then cut the fat into the flour into particles about the size of small peas

In making oatmeal muffins the milk is heated, then poured over the oatmeal which is added to the rest of the mixture. This method gives a finer texture to the product.

If flour is browned for gravy or sauce add a small amount of white flour or cornstarch because browning flour changes some of the starch to sugar and lessens its thickening power.

Baked potatoes will have tender well-flavored skins if they are oiled before baking. To hasten baking the potatoes may be dipped in hot water until warmed through.

Less sugar will be required and a better flavor will result if sugar is added to fruit sauces after cooking. Cooking fruits in sugar syrup helps to preserve the shape because the cellulose of the fruit is toughened by the sugar.

One cup of molasses in a recipe is the equivalent of one third cup of sugar and one cup of liquid. One egg equals one half teaspoon leavening agent. If one cup ground nuts is used one third cup less butter

cocoa equal one square of chocolate.

Oregon Farm's Doings

HEPPNER—A 98 to 100 per cent bill was made on morning glories in Morrow county treated with chemicals during 1929, reports C. W. Smith, county agent.

ENTERPRISE—Sulfur and complete fertilizer are apparently giving some increase in alfalfa yield in Wallowa county.

DALLAS—Observations made by J. R. Beck, county agent, on the effect of alfalfa on drain tile revealed that in places where the alfalfa had been growing over drain tile for three years the roots were all around the tile, but had not penetrated it.

LAKEVIEW—A Lake county farmer who seeded 15 acres of yellow sweet clover last year now has enough pasture to carry an average of two and one half cows per acre all season, says county agent P. T. Fortner. The acreage is divided into 7 and 8 acre fields and is irrigated.

CORVALLIS—Diseased conditions which proved to be fire blight in apples and pears have been reported to the horticultural department of O. S. C. from both Morrow and Grant counties. The first indications of this disease seem to be the dying back of tips.

PRINEVILLE—Manganese sul-

phate applied at the rate of two pounds per tree has given very beneficial results on shade and fruit trees affected with yellow leaf in Crook county. The leaves regained their deep green color about 10 days after the application was made, according to W. D. Tucker, county agent.

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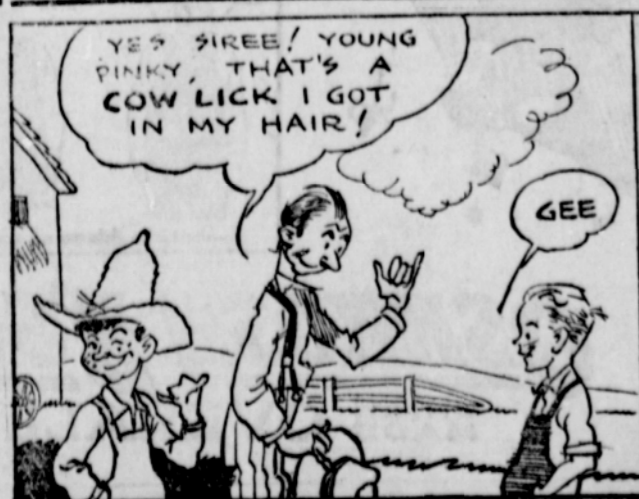
