He spat again, thought deeply, and then in a sudden burst of confidence, exclaimed: "Tell you what, neighbor, if I was aiming to go to Cincinnati I wouldn't start from here."

Most of us want to arrive, but we'd like to start from somewhere else. Maybe I'm wrong, but I have come to the conclusion that it doesn't make much difference where one starts, that all businesses are good and all are bad, all are dull and all are thrilling.

Mrs. C. Bowman and daughter Majorie of Merrill, Oregon are spending the week here visiting Leonard Bowman and family.

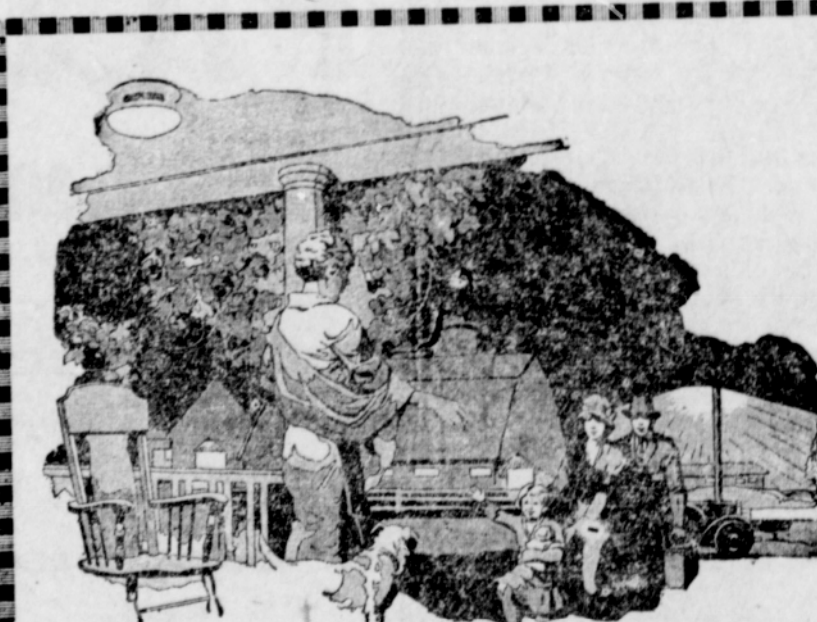
En Route to Seattle
