Fashions range from the old fashioned to the newfangled—from the kooky to the conservative. Figures are subtly defined with waistlines wandering from the high to the low and often completely disappearing. Skirts are sheathed, A-lined or flounced—they fall short of the knee or skirt the ankles.

Shaping the new fashions are cotton knits and laces, a wide variety of printed broadcloths, cotton ducks and sheer voiles.

A long patio shift in black and white sailcloth illustrates the uninhibited, individualistic spirit of the new fashions. A big, bold white diamond, highlighting the black bodice, is dramatically repeated in black on the white A-line skirt. For at home entertaining, for walking the decks, this fashion is a cruise season sensation.

And what cruisewear wardrobe would be complete without an assortment of cotton knits conveniently tucked away. A contemporary shift, inspired by the Dutch painter Mondrian and the French couturier Yves St. Laurent, is made in a white cotton knit and geometrically divided by intersecting green bands. Emulating the canvases of Mondrian are blocks of bright blue that cut the all white look.

For the switched on set, granny gowns are the latest and loveliest. Fashioned from a wide assortment of small cotton prints, grannies are empire in silhouette and skirt the ankles. Lace trims and self ruffles enhance the quaint look. A perky red calico gown with an empire tie and scoop neck bodice is typical of the trend. The granny fad, born on the west coast, has grown in popularity over the entire country. Originally worn on the streets by the sixteen-and-under-set, the fad has been translated into at-home and on-the-beach fashions.

Small prints are also big news for sportswear separates. Delightful daisies dress up a black pin dot fabric that shapes a cool, crisp cotton suit ensemble with a dotted swiss blouse. The same print molds a pair of bell bottomed trousers. Again, the feeling of the pin dot fabric is picked up by a white sleeveless dotted swiss blouse.

Evening fashions are frankly feminine with necklines making headlines. Strapless dresses halter neck and fashions with provocative back cutouts spell out fashion '66. A one-shouldered, cotton lace dress with a diagonal flounce edged in velvet illustrates the fashion point. The dramatic design skims the figure—falls short of the knee.

Take Care Applying Mascara

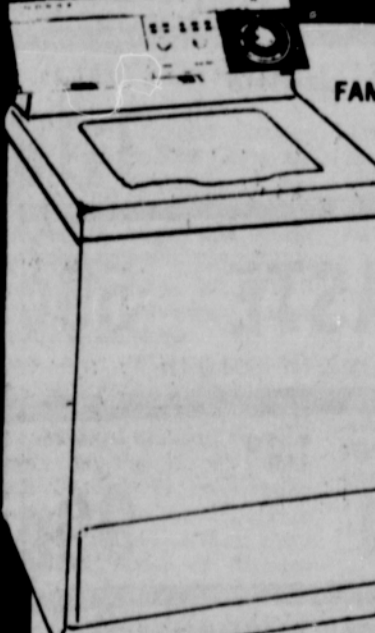

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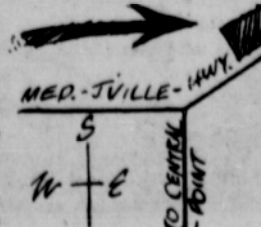
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
