Two First Aid Classes Formed By Jackson County Red Cross

The Jackson County Chapter of the American Red Cross announced the formation of two first aid classes which are scheduled to begin this week. The classes will not only include Red Cross first aid, but will also provide a complete course in medical self-help.

First aid was designed to train individuals in what to do until a doctor arrives on the scene. Medical self-help was developed by the U. S. Public Health Service in cooperation with the Office of Civil Defense to prepare people to meet their own health needs if disaster strikes and no doctor is available. The local Red Cross Chapter has been requested to provide this training in the area because they already have qualified instructors available and facilities to present the material. Persons enrolling in either of next week's classes will receive certification in both first aid and medical self-help.

Advanced Class
The class beginning on Wednesday, at 7:30 p.m., in the Chapter House, 60 Hawthorne Ave. in Medford, will be an advanced first aid class combined with medical self-help. Instructor for this 10 week program will be Robert France. Eligibility for this class includes a current standard first aid card.

On Thursday, at 7 p.m., there will be a standard first aid and medical self-help class in the chapter house. This session will cover an eight week period of time, with Norman Nelson as instructor. This class has been

designed specifically to meet the needs of youth leaders in the community; however, anyone wishing this training will be welcome.

Mrs. Roy Wilkes, safety services chairman for the Red Cross, said the courses consist of instruction in radioactive fallout and shelter, healthful living in emergencies, artificial respiration, bleeding and bandaging, fractures and splinting, transportation of the injured, burns, shock, nursing care of the sick and injured, infant and child care, and emergency childbirth. The lesson content covers situations which might be encountered in day-to-day emergencies, natural disasters or even a nuclear attack.

Remote Areas
She pointed out the value of such training to persons who live in remote areas of the county which might be cut off from the usual facilities during floods and snow storms. It would be invaluable training for the outdoorsman who spends his vacation time in the mountains away from the usual habitats of man, she added.

Persons wishing to enroll in either of the classes may register by calling the Red Cross office in Medford.

Seminars For High School Journalism Teachers Slated

Two three-week seminars for high school journalism teachers and publications advisers will be held at the University of Oregon School of Journalism during the 1966 summer session.

Both seminars will be sponsored by The Newspaper Fund, a foundation supported by the Wall Street Journal. The fund will provide full-cost scholarships for 25 teachers at each of the two seminars.

The university's School of Journalism will be one of five around the nation where Newspaper Fund seminars will be conducted in 1966. Others will be held at Syracuse, Marquette, the University of Texas, and the University of Minnesota. Similar seminars have been scheduled at the University of Oregon for the last three summers.

The first of the 1966 Oregon seminars will run from June 20 to July 8, and will be designed for teachers or advisers with little or no background in journalism course work or practical experience.

The second seminar, from July 11 to July 29, will be for advisers or teachers with some experience and will emphasize advanced journalistic writing. Each of the seminars will carry four quarter hours of university credit.

The Newspaper Fund program of summer fellowships is in its eighth year. Its purpose is to strengthen the quality of high school journalism courses and to improve student publications, and in the long run to encourage interest in journalism careers.

Applications for Newspaper Fund fellowships for the two Oregon seminars should be made directly to The Newspaper Fund, Inc., P. O. Box 300, Princeton, New Jersey, not to the School of Journalism. The deadline for applications is Feb. 10.

Firm Aids 4-H Sewing Endeavors

Whatever is worth doing at all, is worth doing well, observed an ancient philosopher. And it is on this premise that one of the learn-by-doing programs offered by 4-H is based. It teaches 4-H leaders and members how to properly use a sewing machine to obtain perfect results.

The aim is to acquaint home sewers with the mechanics of the machine such as how to thread, regulate stitches and tension, use the right needle and thread for different fabrics. New developments in textiles produce fabrics which not only challenge one's skill and imagination, but heighten the enjoyment of creative sewing, said Mrs. Joyce Foulds, a clothing specialist.

Cooperating with the extension service in training personnel and volunteer 4-H clothing leaders is The Singer Company. Specially prepared training manuals and other assistance are provided by the company where and when requested.

Since the program was introduced 11 years ago, more than 76,000 extension persons and leaders have taken the course.

New Cotton Styles In Mad Scramble

Cruise cottons featuring mad scrambles of patterns, colors and fabric textures ride the crest of fashion, reports the National Cotton Council.

It's a brave new world for designers who have united bold pop art prints with stripes, squares with solids, stripe with polka dot and large scale abstract prints with smaller ones.
