FREE PALAVER

THE FEDERAL AID NET IS CLOSING..... The biggest deception ever perpetrated against a free people by any gang of power-hungry, egotistical fabricators is this Federal Aid fiasco which the American people have fallen for so ingloriously.

First, who are the engineers of this knavery? It is by no means confined to the official Johnson administration; it has been operating through the last several decades and the political administrations simply furnish the implementation of the fraud.

Carpenter Files For Legislature

Dunbar Carpenter, prominent Jackson County farmer and president of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival today announced that he will file on the Democratic ticket for the state legislature.

Carpenter is a member and past president of the Fruit Growers League and the Medford Pear Shippers. He is first vice president of the Oregon Horticultural Society and a past president of the Oregon Egg Producers.

Carpenter is president of the Jackson County Coop, a petroleum distributing firm. He is treasurer of the Rogue Valley Art Association, a past member of the United Crusade, and is currently a member of the Governor's Advisory Committee on the Arts.

Carpenter is married and the father of three children, one a teacher, another a senior in high school, and a son who is in Harvard.

Swamp Creek Road Repair Up For Bid

Bids are being called for the repair of 1.69 miles of the Swamp Creek Road, under the Bureau of Land Management Storm Repair Program, in Jackson County, according to Donald J. Schofield, district ranger of the Medford District Office.

The proposed repair begins approximately 26 miles northeast of Rogue River. Access to the project area is via the Evans Creek County roads and the BLM controlled West Fork Evans Creek access road.

Estimated quantities for the work to be performed include a lump sum item for clearing and grubbing; 81 stations of unclassified excavation; 1.69 miles of finishing previously constructed subgrade; 4,200 cu. yds. of crushed aggregate base; 190 lin. ft. of cleaning culvert in place; 758 lin. ft. of culvert installation; 250 cu. yds. of loose rip rap; and other items of work.

Contract time of 90 working days will be allowed for performance of the work. Bids will be received at the Bureau of Land Management, Service Center, 910 N.E. Union Avenue, (P.O. Box 3861), Portland, 97208, until 2 p.m., PST, March 24.

Chest X-Ray Clinic Relocated In County Health Center

The chest x-ray clinic which has been operated by the Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health Assn. at the Sacred Heart Hospital in Medford for the past 12 years, has been installed by General Electric company at the Jackson County Public Health Center at the Fairgrounds in Medford. It will be located permanently in the Health Center and will be operated as a cooperative program of the Health Association and the Health Department.

Decision to locate the clinic at the Health Center was made by the association's case finding committee and the Medical Society advisers to the association when it was found there would not be space available in the new hospital.

Same Hours The clinic will be open for x-rays to the public during the same hours as at the hospital--each Thursday afternoon from 2 to 5 p.m. and the first Wednesday evening of each month from 7 to 9 p.m.

Ed Barry, co-chairman of the association's case finding committee, pointed out that the x-ray clinic is operated as part of the association's program to detect tuberculosis as well as other respiratory and chest conditions such as emphysema, lung cancer, chronic bronchitis and some heart ailments. Barry also pointed out that a person could have TB and be spreading the disease without knowing it.

The 4x5 screening films are read by local radiologists including Dr. Earl Lawson, Dr.

Richard Saul, Dr. A.S. Markoe and Dr. William Stewart. Films are filed at the health department and are available to local physicians at any time.

In order to keep this a permanent program, a small charge is made to cover costs of film and x-ray materials, association officers state, but pointed out that no one is denied an x-ray because of inability to pay.

"We are glad to have this additional facility to add to our public health program and the prevention of a communicable disease," Dr. Merkel stated.

Robert Dames, association president, expressed appreciation to the Jackson County Court for use of space in the public health center.

Ashland members of the board of directors of the Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health Assn. include Mrs. Forrest Lesher, Mrs. Que Jameson, Dr. Dana Clark, Gary Bo-shars and Mrs. Lawrence Messal.

The parks commission is now investigating two sites on the Applegate River which would form a huge park at one of the best fishing spots on the river.

Other sites the parks and recreation commission and the county court are investigating include, three spots on the Rogue River, one on Lake Creek and three on Bear Creek.

The Commission also plans to increase the facilities within the park system this year. It plans to provide 290 trailer sites compared to the present 251; 234 picnic sites compared to the present 173; 584 picnic tables compared to the present 454; 510 fireplaces compared to the present 397 and other improvements.

Floyd Hart Files For Legislature

Floyd H. Hart, 34, 116 Black Oak Drive, Medford, announced yesterday he will seek the Republican nomination for Position One to the Oregon Legislature from Jackson County.

Hart, a native of the county, is currently a partner in Security Insurance Agency and is seeking the position now held by John Dellenback. Dellenback yesterday announced he will be a candidate for Congress from the Fourth District.

Hart is a graduate of Medford High School and attended the University of Colorado and Oregon State University. He served four years in the U.S. Air Force during the Korean conflict and is president of the Medford Planning Commission.

In addition to his many community and civic activities, he is on the board of directors of Rogue Valley Hospital, Crater National Bank, and is a past director of the Medford Chamber of Commerce.

He is married and the couple has three daughters.

Donald K. Denman, Medford attorney, was elected chairman of the Jackson County Republican Central Committee Monday night following the resignation of Mrs. Eve Nye.

More Funds For Parks To Be Sought

The Jackson County Budget Committee is expected to be asked for \$100,000 for land acquisition by the Jackson County Parks and Recreation Commission.

This is the same amount requested at last spring's budget session. However, nearly \$64,000 of the current allocation is uncommitted as yet.

Jackson County now has 7,093 acres of both land and water within the parks system, including the land owned by Federal government and administered by the county.

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Judge Earl Miller Seeks Re-Election

County Judge Earl M. Miller today announced he would seek re-election to the Jackson County Court for a third term.

Miller, 59, and a Republican, in a statement, said: "Based upon what I think our county needs are, I feel that I should offer my services for another term."

"Basically I think we have a good growth in population in the county and that this growth calls for the need of an experienced person."

He said he planned no intensive campaigning but that he would get around the county and discuss issues with anyone.

He said he felt air and water pollution will need special attention in the months to come, that the county's arterial roads must be improved to meet growth, and that wage scales for county employees must be adjusted in relation to wages elsewhere.

He added that should he win, Ashland would get its fair share in any discussions by the court.

Reluctant Medicare Clients

Government administrators running the new Medicare program are having trouble getting the 65-and-older group to sign up before the March 31 deadline. This must be very embarrassing to the politicians and bureaucrats who have long contended that "the people," especially the old folks, were demanding the Medicare program.

Latest move to sell the program to reluctant eligibles is a thing called "Medicare alert." Under this project, a crew of Medicare promoters will make house calls in communities as part of a crash sign-up promotion.

It is apparent that the government lacks the club of economic persuasion in the voluntary Medicare program that is used in signing up participants in the so-called "voluntary" farm programs.

One of the arguments being used to push people into the Medicare program is the warning that if they don't sign up by March 31, they won't have another chance to do so for two years.

This is not nearly as strong a compulsion as is used on farmers who are threatened with lower farm income through government dumping of surpluses at price-wrecking levels to force them into the feed grain and wheat programs.

It may also be that many feel that the Medicare program falls far short of the extravagant promises made by President Johnson when he was running for election.

This disillusionment with the Great Society which is cropping up in many places is generally referred to as "the credibility gap." This is a polite way of saying that people don't believe all that the Administration tells them in carefully staged TV fireside chats.

There probably is another reason for the less than wholehearted response to regimentation, even in this day when government pokes into every nook and cranny of life.

Americans, unlike their European neighbors, have not fully accepted the idea that the State is the complete master of their destinies. We may not be as independent as the early pioneers who broke the ground on the wilderness frontiers, but there are some remnants of a free spirit that find the cloak of big government a little scratchy.
