Those who helped score the 53 1/2 points for the Eagles were Wayne Millard, first in the broad jump, with a leap of 20 feet, 4 inches, and freshman Gary Thomas, fourth place with a jump of 19 feet, 5 inches. The 880 yard relay team of Gary

Thomas, Everett Glasgow, Richard Bartling, and Wayne Millard combined for a time of 1:36. The 440 yard relay team, Gary Thomas, Roy Meyers, Wayne Millard and Everett Glasgow took first in 47.8. Fine individual performances were turned in by Wayne Millard and Dean Komopsek in the pole vault. They vaulted 12 feet in third place, and 11-6 for fourth place respectively. Bill Harper placed fifth in the discus and sixth in the shot put. Richard Bartling ran a 13-7, 120 yard low hurdles, in his leg of the third place shuttle hurdle team. The next competition for the Eagles will be the Little Rogue Relays at Phoenix, this Saturday.
