The 7th Annual District 6 Speech Festival was held on Saturday, May 7th, at Crater High School. Participating were the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades of Central Point, Sam Valley, and Gold Hill. This is the culminating event of their class work in oral communications.

The festival is composed of 6 events: 3 Reading events: Humorous, Serious and Poetry and 3 speaking events: Oratorical declamation, original speaking and story telling. Each student prepares or selects his own material. After general class work, the schools do their own elimina tion, because the entrance is limited in number. 130 speakers, were involved in the Festival. Each person presented his selection twice on Saturday to a panel of critics, who gave him advice on how to improve his work.
