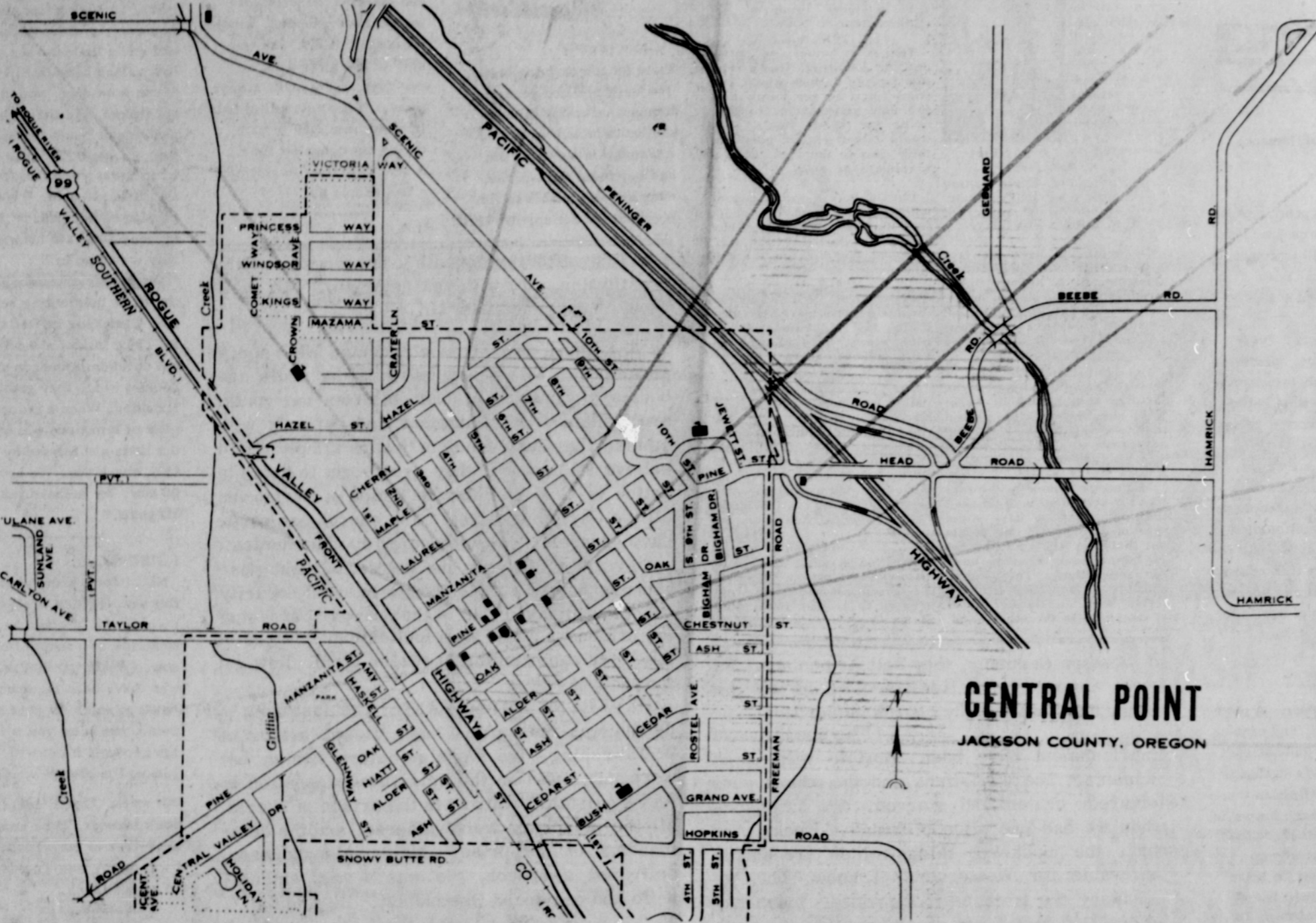

## CELEBRATE at CENTRAL POINT

### RED, WHITE AND BLUE FOURTH SET FOR CENTRAL POINT

The third annual Fourth of July FAMILY FESTIVAL in Central Point will begin this year with an old fashioned breakfast at an old fashioned price at the Central Point Fire Hall sponsored by members of the Volunteer Fire Department.

Serving will begin at 6 a. m. on the Fourth and last until 11 a. m. Pancakes will be on the menu, all you can eat for only 50 cents per person.

at 9:30 a. m. entrants for the parade, Red, white and blue. will gather at the 3 Boys Market in the city. This will be the best and largest parade in

the history of Central Point, complete with a Color Guard, floats and old time vehicles, music, a pet parade, decorated bikes, costumes, horses, carriages and maybe even a gunfight or two. Marching will begin at 10 o'clock.

Following the parade, the public will gather at the city Park where Norm Hansen's Band will provide music throughout the day and there will be games, races, booths, hot dogs, cotton candy, pop and ice cream for the enjoyment of families at old time prices. The fun will continue all day.

### JULY 4th, BELLS WILL RING THROUGHOUT THE NATION

At eleven o'clock, a. m., July Fourth, bells throughout Jackson County will join with others throughout the United States in celebration of Independence Day.

The custom of ringing bells, springing from the ringing of the famed Liberty Bell following the signing of the Declaration of Independence, is being revived throughout the country. Bells in churches, schools, fire houses, factories, wherever there is a bell are expected to ring for four minutes as a reminder of our freedom so dearly bought by the Revolutionary War.

Many radio and television stations will broadcast the sound of bells, followed by the reading of the Declaration of Independence.

The local celebration was initiated by the Jackson County Chapter of American Association of Retired Persons, in cooperation with a national effort by AARP to encourage widespread observance of our national holiday in this way. The plan has been endorsed by

Medford Senior Citizens, the American Legion, the Ministerial Association, and numerous other individuals and organizations.

Mayor James Dunlevy, Medford stated that he is greatly pleased with the plan and is expected to issue a proclamation in its behalf.

Monty Morris, recently named head of the local chapter of the American Legion has expressed enthusiastic support of the program.

Omar Bacon, city and county librarian said he is gratified to see this type of recognition given to this important national holiday.

Dean Mather, president of the local chapter of AARP, has addressed letters to Governor Mark Hatfield and to many mayors of all the cities in Jackson County requesting their cooperation with the program in every possible way.
