ORDINANCE NO. 156

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF PAVING, CURBS, AND GUTTERS ON MAPLE STREET BETWEEN U.S. HIGHWAY 99 AND 10TH STREET, CITY OF CENTRAL POINT, OREGON, DESCRIBING THE REAL PROPERTY TO BE SPECIALLY ASSESSED FOR THE COST OF SAID PROJECT, DECLARING THE COUNCIL'S INTENT TO CAUSE CONSTRUCTION OF SAID IMPROVEMENT AND TO ASSESS A PART OF THE COST THEREUPON TO ADJACENT PROPERTIES WHICH ARE SPECIALLY BENEFITED THEREBY; PROVIDING FOR A HEARING OF THE COUNCIL TO CONSIDER PROTESTS AGAINST SAID IMPROVEMENT PROJECT; AND PROVIDING FOR THE GIVING OF NOTICE OF SAID HEARING.

THE PEOPLE OF CENTRAL POINT DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The plans and specifications for the construction of paving, curbs and gutters on Maple Street between U.S. Highway 99 and 10th Street, City of Central Point, Oregon, which plans and specifications are on file in the office of the City Recorder, are hereby approved.

SECTION 2. That it is the intention of the City Council to cause said construction project to be completed according to the above described plans and specifications, and to assess upon each parcel of real property adjacent thereto, which adjacent parcels of real property are specially benefited by said improvement project, the proportionate share of each parcel of the cost of the construction of said project.

SECTION 3. It is the said intention of the City Council to assess the following real property, which real property is described as follows:

SECTION 4. The City Council of the City of Central Point will meet at the City Hall, Central Point, Oregon, on August 2, 1966, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock p.m., at which time and place the owners of all the real property to be specially assessed as above described are hereby invited to appear before said Council and show cause, if any there be, why the said improvements should not be made in accordance to said plans and specifications, and why said above described real property should not be specially assessed for the costs of said improvement as herein above set forth.

SECTION 5. The City Recorder is hereby directed to serve notice of the said hearing on the aforesaid real property owners by publishing this ordinance in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Central Point, Oregon, at least ten days before the date of said hearing, and by posting a copy of this ordinance in a public and conspicuous place at the Central Point City Hall for a period of ten days prior to said hearing.

FRESH PEACH CREAM PIE

9" Baked Pie Shell
1 package (about 3 1/2 ounces) vanilla instant pudding
1 cup milk
1 cup whipping cream
4 firm fresh peaches, peeled and sliced

In small mixer bowl, blend pudding and milk at low speed. Add cream and beat at medium speed until soft peaks form, about 2 minutes. Fold in sliced peaches, reserving 1/4 cup for garnish. (Sprinkle reserved peaches with lemon juice to prevent discoloration.) Pour filling into baked pie shell. Garnish with reserved peaches. Refrigerate 2 hours or until firm.
