INDUSTRIAL MANUAL

Industrial Forestry Association had mailed the 13th biennial edition of its OREGON POCKET MANUAL ON FOREST LAWS AND PRACTICE to 688 logging operators and certified West Coast Tree Farmers throughout Western Oregon.

"After 26 years of successful Keep Oregon Green activity, loggers and tree farmers must constantly be alert to the potential threat of forest fires," declared IFA executive vice president W. D. Hagenstein.

"That's why we continue to update our POCKET MANUAL every two years and distribute it to Western Oregon loggers and tree farmers to help them prevent forest fires," the forester said.

With the memory of the terrible Oxbow fire of last year so fresh, Hagenstein urged loggers and tree farmers to redouble their efforts during 1967. He complimented the favorable response of the public to Keep Oregon Green and hoped that everyone would help maintain the already excellent record made so far this year in forest fire prevention.

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QUESTION & ANSWER

QUESTION: What changes did the 1967 Legislature make in the Department of Employment law?

ANSWER: The two major changes made, increased the maximum weekly benefit amount of unemployment insurance from \$44 per week to \$49 per week and effects a new employer tax schedule which ranges from 0.8 percent of the employee's first \$3,600 earnings to 2.7 percent. The new benefit rate will go into effect on July 1, 1967 and the new tax schedule will take effect on January 1, 1968. The new tax schedule reduces the average rate from 1.9 percent to 1.3 percent. The minimum weekly benefit amount remains at \$20 per week and the weekly benefit amount is figured by using 1.25 percent of the claimant's base year earnings.

Other changes in the law included a modification of disqualification for unemployment insurance benefits in the case of hardship cases when the claimant leaves work to join or accompany his or her spouse or on account of domestic duties; defines the term "independent contractor" in regard to eligibility under unemployment insurance laws and modifies the existing law in regard to charging base year employers' accounts for person who leave their employment voluntarily.
