## Bashful Spider Creeping North, Stirs Concern

A timid little spider called "The Brown Recluse" has been causing a health problem in 13 southern states, and indications are that it is entering other states, some in the North.

The Health Insurance Institute described this creepy crawler as "presenting a greater potential hazard than the black widow spider." The main

problem is that unlike the black widow, an outdoor species, the Recluse likes the indoors. It hides in socks, shoes, and bedclothes and will usually bite only in self-defense.

A recent article in the Journal of the American Medical Association, warning of the spread of the spiders, noted that many of those bitten who become ill from the bites don't even know they were bitten. The bite may feel no worse than a minor pin prick. The effect is rarely fatal.

## STATE FAIR TALENT SHOW

SALEM — If you can sing, dance, play an instrument or do acrobatic numbers, contact the Oregon State Fair, says Kenneth Waldroff who is taping the fair's annual Oregon Talent Show.

Waldroff has set three groups of auditions, first of which will be July 8 from 9 to 12 a.m. and from 1 to 4 p.m. at the State Fair 4-H Building. The next Salem audition is Aug. 5, during the same hours and at the same place.

Portland auditions are July 7 and Aug. 4 at Pacific Power and Light Public Service Auditorium at 920 S. W. 6th Ave. Hours are from 1 to 6 p.m. and from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

Eugene dates are July 15 and Aug. 12 at the Ym and YWCA from 9 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 4 p.m.

Waldroff said that persons who cannot manage one of these should write or call him for alternate times.

To be considered are vocal and instrumental solos, ensembles, ballet and other dance numbers, acrobatic numbers, baton twirlers and stage bands. There is no age limit, but all auditions should be made by appointment.

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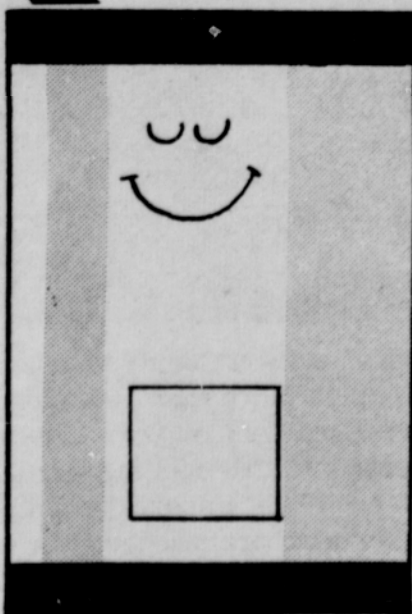
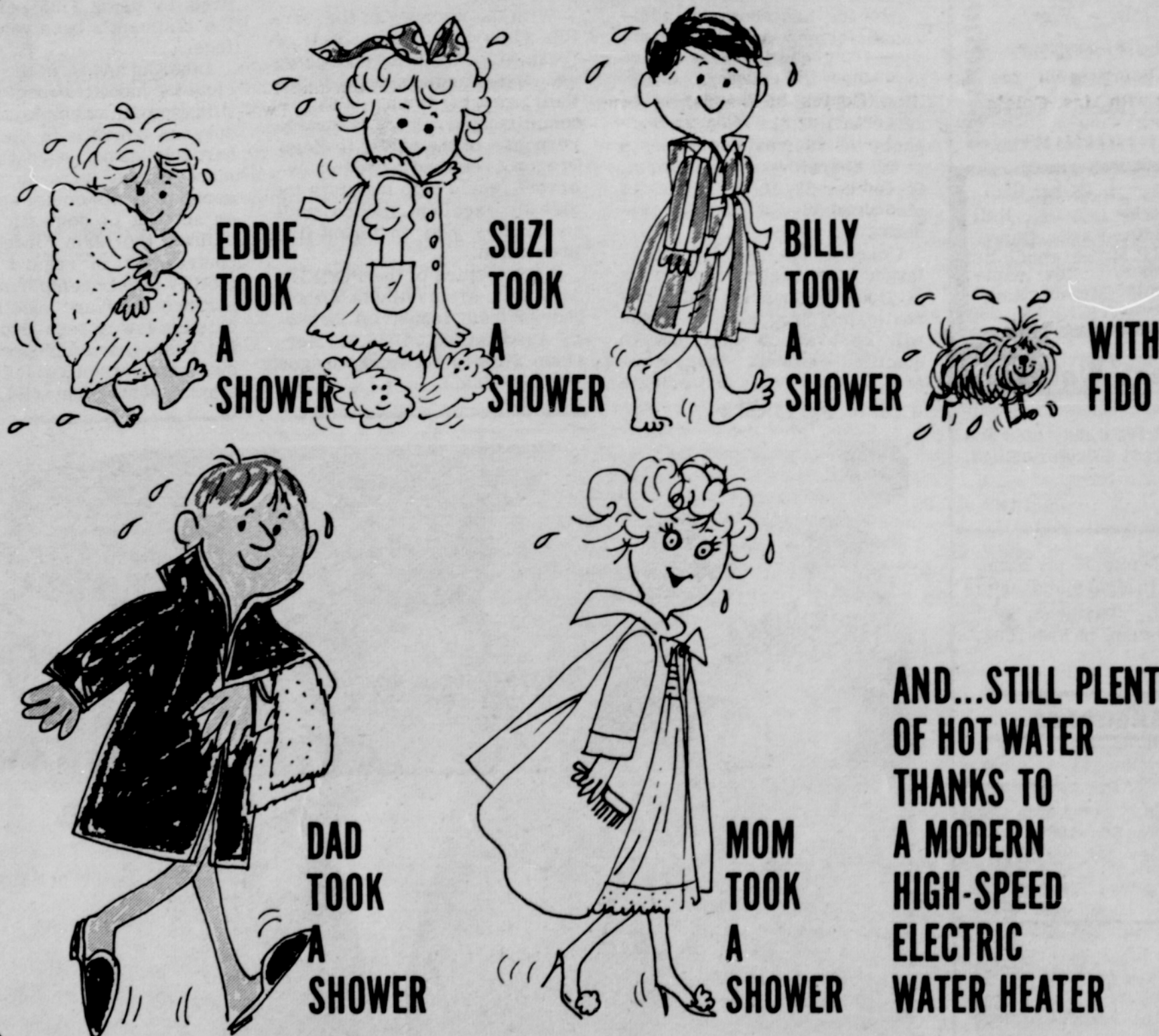
