Continuing until Monday, March 15, which is the last day for filing federal income tax returns for the calendar year 1925, field deputies from the office of Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue at Portland, will visit the principal cities and towns of Oregon to assist taxpayers to prepare their returns and compute the amount of tax due the government.

The damage to dining-room equipment resulting from the riot involving approximately 200 convicts in the Oregon state penitentiary at Salem will be paid out of the prisoners' amusement fund, according to announcement made by J. W. Lillie, warden of the institution. Warden Lillie said that it probably would require \$100 to replace the broken dishes and repair the tables, chairs and other furnishings.

The recent freshets in the Santiam river and Hamilton creek worked a great benefit to the shingle industry of Lebanon. The Super Shingle company had a large number of shingle bolts in Hamilton creek, which they were unable to get down the stream to the mill at Lebanon. The high water became of the right stage to easily float the bolts, and the company got to the mill nearly 2000 cords of shingle bolts.

Ten thousand pine trees, beetle-infested, in the Spencer creek watershed, west of Klamath Falls, will be sacrificed this year by three lumber concerns in a desperate effort to stamp out the parasite infestation. The three concerns are the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, the Long-Bell Lumber company and the Oshkosh Lumber company. It is estimated that the 10,000 trees that must be cut represent between 5,000,000 and 10,000,000 board feet of timber. At \$4 a thousand the stumps would cost between \$35,000 and \$40,000. The pine beetle control

camp, composed of 20 men, has commenced control work.

Wild geese that have become intrepid and, due to the closed season, are immune from the ordinary menaces of hunters and shotguns, have made their winter home in Gilliam county, near Arlington and Blalock. A man has been employed by the game commission to drive constantly up and down the wheat fields in an automobile to frighten the geese away, due to complaints received several weeks ago from farmers that their wheat fields were being despoiled, but the geese have become so tame that this has so far had little effect, the geese going no further away from the fields than is necessary to keep from being actually run down. In the neighborhood of 50,000 to 75,000 geese are estimated to be encamped in the region.

Business of the Lane County Farmer's Co-operative Warehouse company at Eugene was better in 1925 than it had been during any previous year, according to the annual report of the manager, made at a meeting of stockholders. Total sales during the year were \$387,808.17.

The condition of Representative Willis C. Hawley of Salem is reported considerably improved and it is expected that he will be back at his desk in the house soon. Representative Hawley is one of the victims of the influenza epidemic which swept congress last week.

The Tillamook Game Protective association at a meeting in Tillamook opposed any movement to close either the Big or Little Nestucca rivers to commercial fishing. The action of the club was in opposition to efforts of Willamette valley sportsmen to have the streams closed.

The Eugene chamber of commerce sent a telegram to Dr. Harry Woodburn Chase, president of the University of North Carolina, in which it was stated that the business men of Eugene were eager for a favorable reply to the invitation to become president of the University of Oregon.

Vaile Taylor was shot and killed in the Wild Bear Creek section of Crook county by C. C. McBride, state dry agent, who declared that his pistol was discharged accidentally while the agent and his partner were raiding a dugout in which it was alleged that Taylor was operating a still.

**EDWARDS WINS IN THE BOUT AT GRANTS PASS**

What is generally conceded to be one of the best wrestling matches staged in Southern Oregon was at Grants Pass last night between Sailor Jack Wood of Grants Pass and Billy Edwards of Kansas City, of which Edwards was the victor by the last two falls. In the preliminary Cecil Barrick of the Climate City was downed by George Pete of Glendale. Edwards, the hedlock king and light-heavyweight champion of the world, lost the first fall in fourteen minutes and forty-five seconds by a straight arm scissors, and won the second by a flying mare hold in thirty minutes and four seconds, after having wriggled out of numerous tight positions.

The deciding fall came in twenty minutes, when Wood in his avidity to throw Edwards by means of the straight arm scissors, touched both shoulders to the mat and thereby losing the fall when Edwards was on the mat. The decision of Tex Sawtelle of Portland, the referee, did not

meet the popular approval of the crowd.

Edwards, in talking about his training, explained a spring device, perfected by himself, by which he is able to practice headlocks without inflicting punishment on wrestling partners. When the device is closed it requires the exertion of six hundred pounds, he said.

Wrestling fans are enthusiastic over a return match between the Kansas City grappler and Wood, but as yet no announcement has been made.

**Cost of Liberty Bell**  
The order for the Liberty bell was placed with Robert Charles, a London bell-founder, in 1851 and specified a weight of 2,000 pounds and a cost of 100,000 pounds sterling. It arrived in August, 1752. A clapper stroke cracked it while being tested and it was recast by a Philadelphian twice before it met the tests. It was hung in the steeple in June, 1753. When it was cracked again in 1783, a new bell replaced it.
