

**HIGH SCHOOL NOTES**

The Student Advisory Committee, a new organization submitted to the Student Council by Superintendent H. P. Jewett, was adopted by the Student Body last week.

In proposing this plan Mr. Jewett told the students, "If we can get every student in C. P. High to really and sincerely feel that he can do something to make this high school the best in the state it will improve one hundred per cent in every way. We should adopt a policy or platform stating just what the school stands for and then get every student boosting and working for the interest of the school. The four years that a student spends in high school can never be lived over. The more good fun and worth-while activities that are crowded into those four years the more valuable will be the time spent there."

"While the directing of the school is undoubtedly a responsibility of the faculty, yet the kind and number of student activities a school may have depends largely on the wide-awake leadership shown by the students. The school spirit is largely what the student body wishes to make it."

The purpose of the Student Advisory Committee is: To make suggestions, and to receive suggestions, from other students, for the welfare and benefit of the Central Point High School. Membership: The classes shall choose members for this committee as follows: Seniors, three members; Juniors, two members; Sophomores, two members; Freshmen, one member; faculty, one member. The student body president shall be chairman of the committee. The principal of the high school shall be a member of the committee.
