This is the latest type of transport monoplane with a capacity of 600 pounds, a climbing power of 2,000 feet in two minutes and a speed of over 110 miles per hour. The plane arrived from San Francisco in four hours and fifteen minutes. C. N. Comstock, vice-president of the company, arrived on the morning train and joined the two men at the aviation field, returning north with them. The regular flights are scheduled to commence May 1. The Medford Central Labor Council gave a very successful and enjoyable St. Patrick's Day Dance in the Oriental Gardens last Wednesday night with Alford's Imperial Orchestra of seven pieces furnishing the music.
