ways are among the best in the U. S., the one most noted being the National Pike, built 75 years ago. The bridges that were built at that time are still used, and are kept up-to-date by an occasional application of white-wash. The travel over this road is heavy, it being estimated from a certain point, that from five to six thousand cars pass daily.

No grade is as steep as those in the Siskiyou and occasionally white wooden crosses are seen. These mark the spot where at some time some one has been killed. (This seems to us an excellent reminder and we wonder if a similar system on the Pacific highway might cause drivers to drive more cautiously.) This road is No. 1, as it was the first road construction to be given Federal Aid. The speed limit is 35 miles an hour and an arrest for speeding is seldom known. At Woodfield, Ohio, Mr. Faber met an old time friend from Iowa and the two went together to the Centennial Exposition, of which we expect to hear later.

We are grateful to Mr. Faber for this brief review of his trip and we trust it may be of as much interest to our readers as it has been to us.
