RAILROAD TO COAST SEEN IN PROGRAM

A transcontinental railroad through Grants Pass to the coast can easily be visualized in the development program recently announced by Mr. Arthur James in St. Paul, in

which he prophesies the realization of Jas. J. Hill's dream of a northern line entering California.

Several years ago surveys were made through Southern Oregon for a right of way between Klamath Falls and Crescent City, California. Some of these surveys provided for a line

from Klamath Falls into the timber adjacent to Butte Falls, to Medford through Grants Pass and from here along the right of way owned by the C. & O. C. railway which belongs to the city of Grants Pass. During the past few months additional surveys have been made over this same territory which gives rise to the belief that an extensive Railroad development program is not far distant.

According to Mr. Arthur James, who is one of the largest holders of railroad securities in the country. A northwest railroad would soon find it necessary to build into the rich timber regions of Southern Oregon and California, with San Francisco as one of its outlets.—Southern Oregon Spokesman.
