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PUBLIC HEALTH NEWS

Friends and members of the Jackson County Public Health association may congratulate each other and fellow workers throughout Oregon that the appropriation for the bureau of nursing has been re-instated in the budget of the state board of health. Congratulations should also be extended to the members of the ways and means committee who gave this subject due consideration when they were appealed to with hundreds of letters and telegrams from citizens all over the state.

Health boosters are now asked to sign or wire the ways and means committee at once to appropriate \$220,250 to supplement the \$100,000 carried in the original measure creating the Eastern Oregon tuberculosis hospital. This total amount of \$320,250 will build the hospital and cover all costs to Dec. 31, 1928 and provides for 80 beds. There are 700 active cases of tuberculosis in Oregon, but only 225 hospital beds for those who can not pay for private care. There are no beds in Eastern Oregon so the one tuberculosis hospital in Salem has a waiting list of 56 today which does not include 100 more who would apply if there were any chance to get in. This means that patients wait from three to five months in their homes or cheap lodging houses after they are serious enough to have asked permission to enter a state institution. Of course they are receiving care from the county nurses who travel any distance to look after these patients and even answer emergency calls at night to assist during a hemorrhage or to place them in a local hospital with funds from the Christmas seals.
