A SUCCESSFUL CHRISTIAN

"I hold no brief for the missionary—I am not even religious in the orthodox meaning of the word. . . . But I have known missionaries, and have observed the results of their labors in every great field of evangelistic endeavor, from Persia to Palynesia, from the Congo to the China Seas, and it irritates and angers me to hear missionaries and their work condemned and derided by persons who are speaking from malice, prejudice or ignorance.
 "I am a roving writer, and my job takes me to the four corners of the earth. That's why I can speak first hand about missionaries.
 "It has often seemed to me that no class of public servant—I use the term in its broader sense—has been so persistently maligned, and so generally misunderstood as the missionary. . . . Yet though maligned, misrepresented, miserably underpaid, often desperately lonely frequently facing death. . . he has pursued the tasks assigned him with a courage and devotion which merit the admiration of every right-thinking man and woman"—E. Alexander Powell, American Magazine
 "For God and Home and Native Land" was formerly the motto of the W. C. T. U., but as the years have come and gone and the many women of this organization caught the ennobled missionary spirit, they changed their motto to "For God and Home and Every Land," and today the White Ribbon Sisters are circling the globe with their organizations, a few here and there in every land who are bravely carrying on the splendid work for which we stand.
 Because of our name the "Women's Christian Temperance Union" the word Christian in our name gives us a passport into every church and christian women of every denomination—heretics members of the W. C. T. U., and of them are those members of no church who care to work with us, we are always pleased to have them.
 Some one has said that if ever the power of Christ were answered, where he prayed in John 17 "that all Christians might be one," the answer to this prayer would come through the organizations. Such a prayer is the prayer of the Women's Christian Association and Women's Christian Temperance Union" and like organizations where

the name Christian gives those of any church a right to belong, regardless of denominational affiliation.
 There are leaders in all organizations, who at times fall down and bring reproach upon the cause they would sponsor but the very fact that these organizations are making an effort toward a divine ideal, speaks very definitely in their favor.
 "United we stand, divided we fall" is most assuredly true in all lines of Christian activities be it W. C. T. U. or other departments of work.

More Stringent Laws Proposed.
 A bill which will make it a felony to manufacture, possess, sell or give away malt preparations intended for making alcoholic beverages has been proposed in the Teas legislature. The penalty would be one to five years in the penitentiary.

 University of Oregon, Eugene, April 14.—(Special.)—Chairman of committees in towns throughout the state who had charge of benefits given for the Fine Arts building, turned in \$470.85, it was announced by Edith Dodge of Ashland, general chairman.

The various towns gave teas, dances and moving picture shows to raise money for the building. The largest amount, \$156.85 was contributed by Oregon City. The second largest amount was \$116.65 from Bend. Other contributions were from Dalles, Roseburg, Portland, Grants Pass, Heppner, Seaside, Medford and Hillsboro.

\$100 will be placed on the committee or 1000, while those turning in less will have their names on the Great Book of Remembrance, which is to be placed in the building, and will have an opportunity to make up the \$100 during the summer, it was announced.
