GUEST OF ASHLAND**

Nearly a hundred men and women of Ashland attended the chamber of commerce banquet last Tuesday night at the Lithia Springs hotel, with Governor and Mrs. Patterson as guests of honor. President V. V. Mills of the Chamber acted as toastmaster and an exceptionally good program was listened to. The Ashland high school trio, composed of Mary Galey, Floy Young and Rose Aikins furnished music throughout the evening. E. B. Carter and Senator Geo. W. Dunn gave short and appropriate welcome addresses, as did Rev. P. H. Hammond, Dr. J. A. Churchill and Prof. G. A. Briscoe. A vocal selection by Miss Jennie Grover, accompanied by Miss Leona Marsters brought applause and an encore. Gov. Patterson is speaking in various parts of the state in favor of the proposed income tax and according to the governor's statement as well as his belief, stabilization of the financial situation of our state is assured only through the passage of the two revenue measures, upon which voters of the state will pass at the special election June 28.

**MEDFORD VOTES BONDS
Presumed New City Hall Work Will Soon Start.**

Passing 1391 to 241, \$60,000 bonds for the erection of a new city hall in Medford were passed by the voters.

According to the provisions of the charter amendment passed, the bonds are for the erection of a city hall which shall first be used as a county court house in the event Medford becomes the county seat of Jackson county. Later, when Jackson county has built its own court house on a site to be furnished by the city, the present city hall will be sold and the spacious new building used.

In all four wards, those in favor of the bonds outnumbered those opposed by a large majority. Results by wards showed:

- Ward 1—349 yes; 49 no.
- Ward 2—401 yes; 95 no.
- Ward 3—329 yes; 69 no.
- Ward 4—312 yes; 28 no.

Victory in the election came after a vigorous campaign led by the Medford chamber of commerce and business men, who phoned up voters to remind them of the election, provided transportation and carried on a campaign of education the week prior to the balloting.

THEY, TOO, HAVE SERVED

The daily papers apparently delight in giving publicity to persons of great wealth who occasionally contribute money to charity or educational causes. That the papers are but giving their readers what they want is indicated by the fact that one hears a great deal of talk on the street and elsewhere about these same men of wealth.

Sometimes these remarks are appreciative and sometimes—too often we believe—they are abusive. The point we wish to make, however, is that contributions to the betterment of mankind are not allowed to go unnoticed, when they are made by persons of considerable means.

But what of the others—the man of small means? Perhaps he is in business in some small place. Quite frequently he is called upon to donate to some cause. The Chamber of Commerce, the county fair, the baseball club and innumerable other activities that go to make life better in the small community all need financial support and the merchants and business men along the street meet the need to the best of their ability. Their donations are small, individually, and the donors themselves are legion, hence it is not news.

But it is well to consider that all things are relative. The merchant on Main street passes out a rumpled bill of small denomination; the rich man signs his name to a check of five or six figures; but which of the two have given the most? It is not conceivable that the man of wealth will deny himself anything because of his donation, while it is quite possible that the merchant will find himself hard put to take his discount on the first of the month.

This paper is not decrying the motive or actions of the wealthy. Neither would it detract from any applause they may receive. But we do wish to call attention to those of moderate means who faithfully, year in and year out, give to this or that worthy cause sums which in reality mean more than the more pretentious ones of the well-to-do.
