railroad men, but there has been enough demand for the better class of houses that most of these have been filled. There is, real estate men admit, a number of vacant houses standing in the city, but these, they say are chiefly older buildings which are not in great demand. The newer type of home, either furnished or unfurnished are always easily filled.

Unfortunately there are no figures available in the city to show the number of rentals, trades or sales that

have been consummated. The city has never kept a record of these, nor of the number or type of building permits issued and consequently it is impossible to make a definite correlation. However, the general feeling among real estate dealers is that conditions in Ashland and southern Oregon are not discouraging.

There has been a number of properties purchased by newcomers in this district since the first of the year it is reported, and many have traded for property here. A number of people from Klamath Falls and the surrounding territory have

taken property in Ashland recently the report shows.

**Three Major Buildings**

Three major building constructions are under way in the city at the present time. These are the Crowson Hill reservoir project which is being completed by the city, the Swedenburg building, and a large warehouse being constructed by the Bagley Canning company.

According to Rhodes Judd, contractor in charge of the Crowson Hill project, the reservoir will be completed within the next week. This is two weeks earlier than the schedule calls for, Mr. Judd says, as the contract sets the date for completion as not later than July 1. The reservoir is constructed of concrete and measures 145 by 120 feet across at the top, is 20 1/2 feet deep and will be filled to a depth of twenty feet. The capacity of the reservoir will be 2,200,000 gallons.

Work was begun on the project about the fifteenth of March, and a crew of 15 men have been kept busy ever since.

Water enters the reservoir through holes which are located every ten feet around the base. This keeps the water from stagnating, Mr. Judd explained, by keeping it in circulation. An overflow will carry water to generators which will be a part of the new water system, and the supply pipes will connect with the water mains which are situated at a short distance away.

**Two Story Warehouse**

R. E. Koozer, manager of the Bagley Canning company, is erecting a two story warehouse on the cannery property near the railroad on Helman street. The building will be 60 by 100 feet inside, and the walls will be of steel re-inforced cement, and will have a capacity of 50 carloads. W. F. Sullinger, construction foreman, plans to have the work completed within a month.

Work on the building under construction at the corner of Second and E. Main streets by Dr. F. G. Swedenburg is progressing rapidly, although there is considerable work left to be done. The face of the old building in which the East Side Pharmacy is located has been re-faced with cement and the new building which adjoins this has been partly completed. This will be a two story building, measuring 54 by 75 feet. A. L. Lamb is in charge of construction.

According to figures at the city electrician's office, five new homes have been built since the first of the year. Houses were built for Floyd Dickey, 735 Boulevard, A. L. Calkins, 139 Granite street, H. A. Spencer, 488 Palm avenue, Noll Taylor, 1460 Boulevard and one at 484 Palm avenue for Mr. Spencer.

besides a medical detachment from Salem and a headquarters battery from Marshfield. Every summer, usually during the month of June, these batteries concentrate at a fort somewhere on the coast for training and practice on the guns. For several seasons the artillery men went to Fort Barry, which lies out of San Francisco, and at other times they have gone to forts lying both in Washington and Oregon. This year Fort Stevens was chosen.

At camp, the guardsmen will participate in a thorough training schedule in the handling of the large guns, and will engage in target practice. They will break camp on June 28.

concern or company to make regular rounds of the city and remove all garbage cans, bottles and other rubbish, and be responsible for the disposal of such. It will be necessary to separate combustible and non-combustible articles and place them in individual containers. It will be necessary to put all such trash except garbage in air tight containers, and should not be influenced by coffee grounds, which should be placed with the cans. It will be unlawful to let any garbage or trash remain upon any property lying within the city for a period of time longer than that which is specified in the ordinances. Scavenger service will not be compulsory, if enacted, but will merely be a convenience, and a fee will be charged to everyone who uses this service. In any event the refuse must be disposed of regularly.

The ordinances, as read by attorney Briggs, were handed over to the sanitary committee for investigation.

**Bills Allowed**

The city recorder read financial standings and bills payable, and it was moved by Councilman White that the city treasurer be instructed to make payment of these claims.

A petition was read asking for the immediate improvement of a strip of pavement at this point, it being explained that a water pipe was leaking, softening the ground and causing sinking of the road bed. It was suggested that the old pipe be repaired or new pipe installed.

It was moved and passed by the council that expenses be allowed fire chief Baughman in order that he might accompany the visiting firemen to Marshfield, and also attend the state fire convention.

Water commissioner Earl Hosler explained the necessity for installing a water pump in the new reservoir in order to supply water to a house which lies a short distance above the level of the water, and suggested the purchase of a 400-gallon Fairbanks-Morris machine. In reply to a question concerning the proposed fence that will surround the water shed, Hosler mentioned his plans for making a trip into the Mt. Ashland region to inspect the old fence and ascertain how much new fence must be built.

C. A. Churchill, president of the Southern Oregon Normal school, Walter Redford and Miss Virginia Hale of the faculty, explained the purpose of the Spring Festival which will be held in the Luthia Park Saturday night, and asked for the support of the city in helping make arrangements and in hauling material.

It was unanimously voted by the council to extend the use of all the city's forces to the school.
