## PHOENIX and VICINITY

The new addition to our schoolhouse is progressing rapidly and promises to give us more for our money than any previous work of the kind. We have made several efforts heretofore to furnish adequate school buildings but they have always been too small. We do hope this will meet with the needs of the district.

There are a number of new homes springing up in the territory west of Phoenix, since the Talent Irrigation Company have put water on the land. There is no prettier place in the valley in which to make a home than in this section. All kinds of fruit, gardens truck and berries can be grown to perfection. The land is warm; being of a gravelly composition. Plenty of water and a little water will turn the trick.

We note many truck loads of fine leghorn hens finding their way to market, because of the continued low prices on eggs. This is a pity, as it takes nearly a year to bring hens to their best as layers, and each flock marketed are gone for good, as egg-producers.

A new way is being worked out on several of the big dairy ranches, to utilize Bronko grass and Foxtail. The process consists of a haycutting machine, which cuts it up in as soon as it is cured in the field and hauled to the shelter. The grass is cut before the seeds have begun to ripen which leaves it soft and full of nutriment. Milk cows eat it as readily as grain hay or alfalfa.
