action taken by the council. The estimate given by Engineer Walker amounted to \$350,000 for a wooden bridge, \$1000 for a bridge with concrete posts and a wooden deck, and \$1500 to \$2000 for an all concrete bridge. The material will be charged to the street fund, while men employed by the street, water and light departments will do the work. In this manner it was pointed out there will be but little extra expense.

At the request of chairman of the park board, Frank Jordan it was decided to purchase a mower for the park board at a cost of approximately \$300, this amount to be refunded the council when a new budget is prepared by the board. This will help to relieve the financing difficulty the board has been facing some time, and will allow Ashland's parks to have the care the members of the board are desirous of giving it.

Superintendent of the Water department Earl Hoessler was instructed to purchase sufficient pipe to replace that which is thought to be leaking on Third street. The Light and Water department were given permission to purchase a small concrete mixer to be used jointly by both departments.

Frank Jordan, chairman of the Park Board reported that the Lithia water was now in fine shape, and a faint odor, that has been noticeable since the new pipe line was installed had disappeared.

Chairman of the fountain committee Bergner reported that the committee was working on plans for the fountain, and would be ready to report soon.
