BANK EMPLOYEES DETECT FORGERY

A good forgery, only detected by the keenness of employees of the First National Bank led to the arrest of twenty-year-old Raleigh Hoylman, for too freely using the name of Avgaris Brothers owners of a Siskiyou saw mill, on the signature of two checks. One for \$34.61 was accepted by Virgil Chapman of the East Side Market, and the second made out for \$61.50 and presented to the First National Bank where employees became suspicious and called Chief of Police McNabb. Another check appeared late Saturday when the Ashland Iron Works reported to the Chief of Police that they held one of the checks.

Hoylman was under \$500 bonds in Josephine county on a similar charge, and when taken before local officers his bond was placed at the same amount, and he will be held until the grand jury takes action.

FIRE DOES DAMAGE AT CENTRAL POINT

A raging, leaping oil fire which rapidly ate its way through everything, completely destroyed the Freeman and Wiley warehouse of Central Point and a freight car standing near it at 1 a. m. Monday morning, with an estimated damage of \$25,000.

For a time the huge glare which lighted up the sky above, menaced the whole town and workers at the Copco warehouse nearby were put to their utmost to save the plant.

Flying bits of flaming wood and sparks spread over the whole city and started several small fires on rooftops, but all were extinguished.

Stubborn Fire

The most stubborn forest fires that have occurred in Siskiyou for a number of years have been raging in the Klamath river section during the past week. Around Happy Camp and between there and Orleans Bar fire fighters have had a strenuous time controlling the flames.

The Forest Service sent twenty men out of Yreka Wednesday and five from Fort Jones, which together with those already on the scene make close to a hundred men on the fire line. Wednesday a fire started on the Humbug mountain and yesterday was burning north.

The airplane patrol has been kept busy making repeated trips over the forests of Siskiyou and have located numerous small fires which by being taken in time have been subdued. The fires were started by the heavy electrical
