In place of seeds its produces a great abundance of small butbs or bulblets which appear where flowers and seeds normally appear on other blue grasses. These bulblets are very small and superficially resemble grass seeds, but they form blossoming, while seeds on other grasses cannot form except from blossoms. Furthermore, it also produces below ground enormous quantities of bulbs the size of a small grain of wheat; these occur in dense mats just below the surface of the soil and possess short, shallow, matted roots.
