Simpson also a bonnet which she wore while crossing the plains. This bonnet was given her by her great grandmother making it nearly 300 years old. It is in a remarkable good condition considering the age. Mr. Wisdom also has a knife and trunk of very ancient origin and a letter dated April 30th, 1851 written by a relative and sent from North Platte Missouri to Mr. Wm. Simpson, Portland, Oregon.

The writing is still very plain the ink used is not at all faded. The letter was not sent in an envelope but folded square the size of an ordinary envelope and fastened with a piece of sealing wax the address written on the letter and sent by pony express. After the wagon train which Mrs. Simpson traveled with reached La-Grande Ore. She was shot from ambush by an Indian with a bow and arrow the poisoned arrow head inflicting a wound from which she soon died. She was buried at night on the summit of the Cascades in a coffin made from one of the wagon boxes. The grave was marked and Mr. Wisdom visited it not many months ago.
