KITCHEN CONVENIENCE

Make your kitchen as small as possible. The large kitchen requires miles of extra steps to do the work. The rectangular kitchen is the most convenient.

Have a cupboard in the wall between the kitchen and the dining room. Make it easy to get from the kitchen to the front and back doors, to the telephone, the cellar and the upstairs.

Plan for good lighting both day and night, and good ventilation all the year round.

For floor, wall, and woodwork, choose a finish which will be easily kept clean and which is attractive. Do not spend your life in a dismal kitchen, or do not spend undue time in keeping it clean.

In selecting furnishings one must take into account the needs of the room, the wall and floor space and whether the articles will be used enough to pay for their cost and keep. Sometimes it is more trouble to take care of a "labor saver" to do the work without it. Compare the price and conveniences of built-in furnishings and the movable kind such as cupboards, ironing board, etc.

Determine the right height for your working surfaces. If they are not such that you can work at them comfortably you will get unnecessarily tired each day and will not be so efficient.

Arrange your kitchen in working centers: one for the preparation of vegetables, one for cooking, for serving and, other activities. Group all materials needed for any work in the center where they belong. Arrange these centers in the order in which the work is to be done.

If it is possible have a separate room for the laundering, and keep
