The Southern Oregon Mutual Rabbit Breeders Association held an informal meeting at the city hall last Friday evening. The object of this meeting was to discuss the canning of rabbit meat. The local merchants have agreed to handle the canned product thus assuring a market for the first output, as a result nearly a ton of rabbit meat declared to be superior to chicken for table use was canned in 8 ounce cans on Monday of this week. The meat was first cooked by steam packed in the cans capped and sent through the big automatic ovens. It is planned to market the eight ounce cans for 50c canning costs will be kept and rabbit growers hope in this way to secure an outlet for their large size stock. Recently a corporation has been formed to market rabbits, 1,757 pounds of meat was pooled for the cannery experiment.
