\$9,000,000 annually is expected to be revenue, the tunnel paying for itself in ten years, after which it is said there will be no charge.

Thirteen lives were lost during the building of the tunnel, including Mr. Holland, and Milton H. Freeman, who succeeded him—both of whom virtually worked themselves to death.

Every phase of danger—fire, explosions, leaking gasoline, gas poisoning, stalled engines, collisions, etc., has been anticipated and overcome in actual tests.

There are but four under-water highways for vehicles in the world—two in England, one in Germany and one in Scotland. But the longest of these is but a third the length of the Holland Tunnel. It is built to last a hundred years.

There are two roadways one for coming and one for going traffic. Each roadway is 20 feet wide, carrying a double line of cars with ease. The clearance or headroom in each tube is 13 1-2 feet.

If the opening capacity of tunnels was maintained, 15,190,000 vehicles could pass through the tunnels in one year.
