

DRYS WANT MILLION A YEAR

Philadelphia—An annual budget of \$1,000,000 for the next five years is the aim of the Anti-Saloon League, according to Rev. Howard Hyde Russell, Associate Superintendent. The League urges 5-year jail terms for violations of the Prohibition law and also plans a demand on Congress to end "Bootleg Government."

WHALE FIGHTS ENEMIES

New York, N. Y.—South American sailors arriving, tell of a thrilling combat between a whale and a thrasher and a black fish, in which the whale leaped clean out of the sea in an effort to escape its combined enemies. The black fish jumped into the air to attack the back of the whale, driving it under the water so that the thrasher could get a good chance to use its sharp sword. The ship passed on and thousands of sea birds hovered over the scene waiting for the prey.

175 DRY LAW VICTIMS

Washington, D. C.—Since January 1, five alleged law violators have been killed. This is a much lower casualty list than in any other year since the dry law went into effect. Assistant Secretary Lowman in denying statements to the contrary, said that since 1920 only 175 persons have been killed, of whom 49 were prohibition agents. These figures do not include, of course, those who died in bootleg feuds and other criminal activities.

Washington, D. C.—The White House and grounds are worth \$22,000,000 according to an estimate made by tax assessor W. P. Richards. The value of all Government property in the District of Columbia is estimated at \$470,000,000.

SEIZE AMMUNITION

New Orleans.—Customs officials nipped an ammunition running plot in the bud when they seized 7,500 rounds of 38 calibre cartridges aboard the steamship Cholteca, bound for Puerto Cortez, Honduras and the Lake Wimico, with Tampico as its destination. Five members of the Cholteca's crew confessed ownership of 4,500 rounds of the cartridges while 3,000 rounds of cartridges were taken from an unoccupied stateroom on board the Lake Wimico.

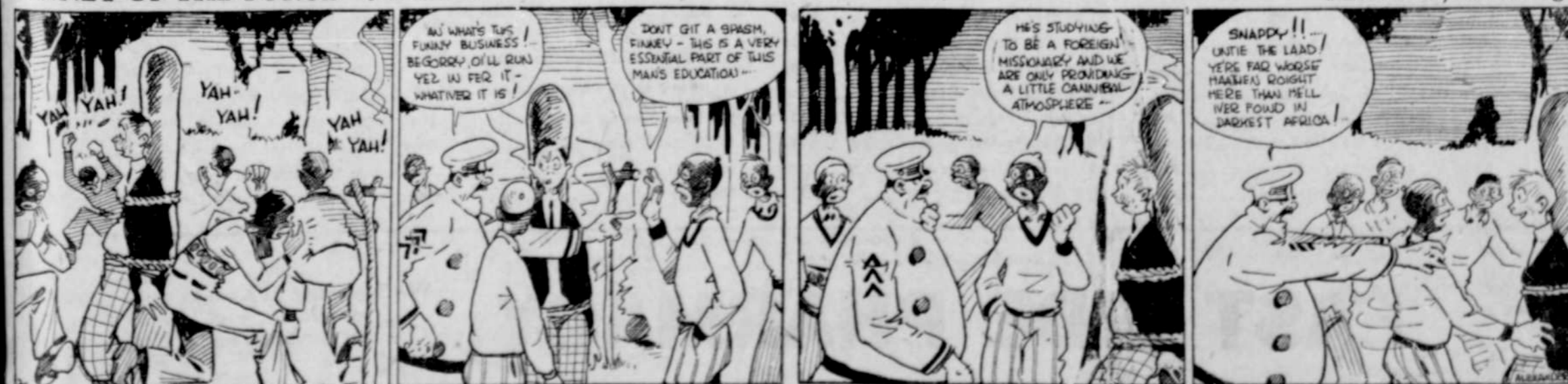
