person to his ideals of democracy and the unyielding loyalty of Woodrow Wilson to the cause of international peace were also pointed out as showing that all great movements are inspired and sustained by the faith of some courageous soul.

When the man sick of the palsy was lowered into the presence of Jesus the physical infirmity was of inferior importance. Covered by the body was a human soul hidden to men but seen by the spiritual eye to be sadly in need of purification and forgiveness. Therefore, when Jesus spoke it was to assure the supplicant that his unanswered prayer was granted and that his eternal future was safe. This accomplishment was demonstrated by the physical cure which followed. While there are those who question miracles, there have been, even in modern times, instances recorded where sincere prayer and earnest pleas for relief have been granted.

Present in the room at the time were certain scribes who witnessed the procedure of Jesus. They were his critics and their presence was more in the hopes of discovering controversial material than for good either for themselves or others. These scribes wanted to know why Jesus spoke as he did. Jesus did not rebuke the inquiry but he questioned the motive. This is the important thing to keep in mind in this day when so many questions are being asked and so many criticisms made. The purpose can be either to honestly find the truth or dishonest and hypocritical.

We are given another incident in today's lesson which shows Jesus attending a great feast at the home of a Matthew, who like Elisha, celebrated his calling to

service by rejoicing. Matthew was a publican, a man who gathered taxes for the hated Romans, and belonged to a class with whom no patriotic Jew would associate. Other representatives of his type were also present, and in addition, there were many sinners, regarded by the Jewish religious authorities as unclean. Again Jesus amazed the strict formalists and hypocritical religionists of his day by freely associating with these two despised classes. Comment was made adversely to his disciples but was dismissed by Jesus who said: "they that are whole have no need of a physician, but they that are sick."

The problem of reaching sinners and social derelicts is one that today causes considerable thought. Many good people hesitate to mix freely with them and there is undeniably some danger, unless one can be sure that he is supported by strong character and moved entirely by unselfish desire to render service.
