APPLE PRICES AVERAGE \$1 BOX FOR FIVE YEARS

Oregon apple growers have averaged just \$1 a box for their fruit for the last five years, according to a study of apple prices completed for 1922 to 1926 by R. S. Besse, associate in farm management, Oregon experiment station.

To determine the actual prices growers have received for apples and to aid the farmers in an intelligent decision relative to handling their orchards, the apple study has been made by the federal bureau of agricultural economic and the Oregon experiment station. The average price received by the growers for 9,606,519 boxes of apples including 23 varieties grown in seven Oregon districts for the five year period was \$1.00 a box. The relative purchasing power was found to have reached the 100 mark only four times in the past 17 years.

Oregon growers were producing too many varieties, it was found. Larger size apples excepting Yellow Newtons bring the highest price. The best method of selling apples was found to be f. o. b. Successful growers are organizing their farms to develop efficiency practices so that cost will be lowered and more fruit offered as high quality and large sizes.
