Irrigation Liens Show Heavy Drag On Land Owners

The burden of taxes for Jackson county may be traced directly to irrigation liens, is now revealed by figures approved by County Assessor J. B. Coleman.

On a hypothetical farm of 32 acres, with a hypothetical value of \$3120, the general tax, under present levies amounts to 81 cents; state school tax, \$12.61; state market roads, \$3.12; general county tax, \$7.89; general county schools, \$20.28; county library, 62 cents; special school \$29.28; special roads, \$7.49; general roads, \$3.12; county fair, 62 cents; county market roads, \$3.74; emergency fund, \$1.25, a total of \$81.74.

The irrigation lien tax on the same hypothetical farm amounts to \$467.30, six times the amount of the county and state taxes.
