County Politics

Politics of the good old fashioned kind, is beginning to boil around Jackson county. According to all indications there will be no trouble in locating candidates for all of the county jobs. It is said that there are an even dozen for the sheriff post. Mr. Jennings has conducted the affairs of the office in a capable manner, and is just becoming thoroughly acquainted with his duties. He is a good man to keep at the post. The same may be said of Assessor Coleman and District Attorney George A. Coddling. Here is what they say:

Sheriff Ralph Jennings, democrat, with a large following throughout the county, is still "on the fence." The same applies to Victor Bursell, county commissioner, who has been in the place for 12 years. He is the best versed man in the county on it's affairs. He said Tuesday he "would not be candidate, for re-election." Friends say that Victor will change his mind.

There is a political wind blowing that urges that the next commissioner be from the south end of the county. Fred C. Homes and John Billings of Ashland have been mentioned for the post. Henry Conger of Jacksonville, L. M. Sweet of Sams Valley and W. A. (Shorty) Morris of the Gold Hill district, all Grange members, have also been mentioned. Morris has told friends he "might make the race." Mike Hanley of Lake Creek has also been mentioned, but balks at the notion.

If Sheriff Jennings does not make the race, it is highly probable that O. W. (Ike) Dunford, his old friend and jailor, would seek the vacancy. George Schermerhorn, farmer, and democrat, has been boomed for the berth. Polk Nininger of Ashland, Everett Beeson of Talent, and Ben Moller of this city have been broached as candidates. Moller, however, has no aspirations, it is said. County Assessor Coleman said today he heard John Grieve, 24 year old son of W. T. Grieve of Prospect, mentioned.

May Run Again

Assessor Coleman has not definitely decided upon what action he will take, but will probably be a candidate, and the same goes for A. C. Walker, treasurer, and District Attorney George A. Coddling. There will no doubt be a number job. Attorney Frank P. Farrell heading the list.

Fatal Accident To Wellknown Table Rock Boy

Crushed when his horse slipped and fell upon him, Russell C. Wilson, 16, died at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. T. Wilson, in Sams Valley Sunday.

The boy was on his way to the Garret ranch, across the road from his home, when the accident occurred. He is said to have been leaning from the saddle to open a gate when the horse fell. Russell was pinned underneath the animal.

He walked to the Garret house and told members of the family that he had been injured. He asked that they help him home. He told how the accident happened in the short period which he lived. He died 20 minutes after the fall and before summoned physicians could arrive at the Wilson home.

Members of the two families believe the youth was going to see his friend, Glenn Garret. He was a sophomore in the Sams Valley high school. Russell Clark Wilson was born at Sams Valley, August 16, 1915. Besides his parents, two sisters and three brothers survive. They are Frances, Betty, Stephen, John and Dean Wilson.

Funeral services were held from the Conger chapel Tuesday at 1:30 o'clock with the Rev. D. E. Millard in charge of the services. Members of the Sams Valley grange conducted the graveside services in the Sams Valley cemetery.
