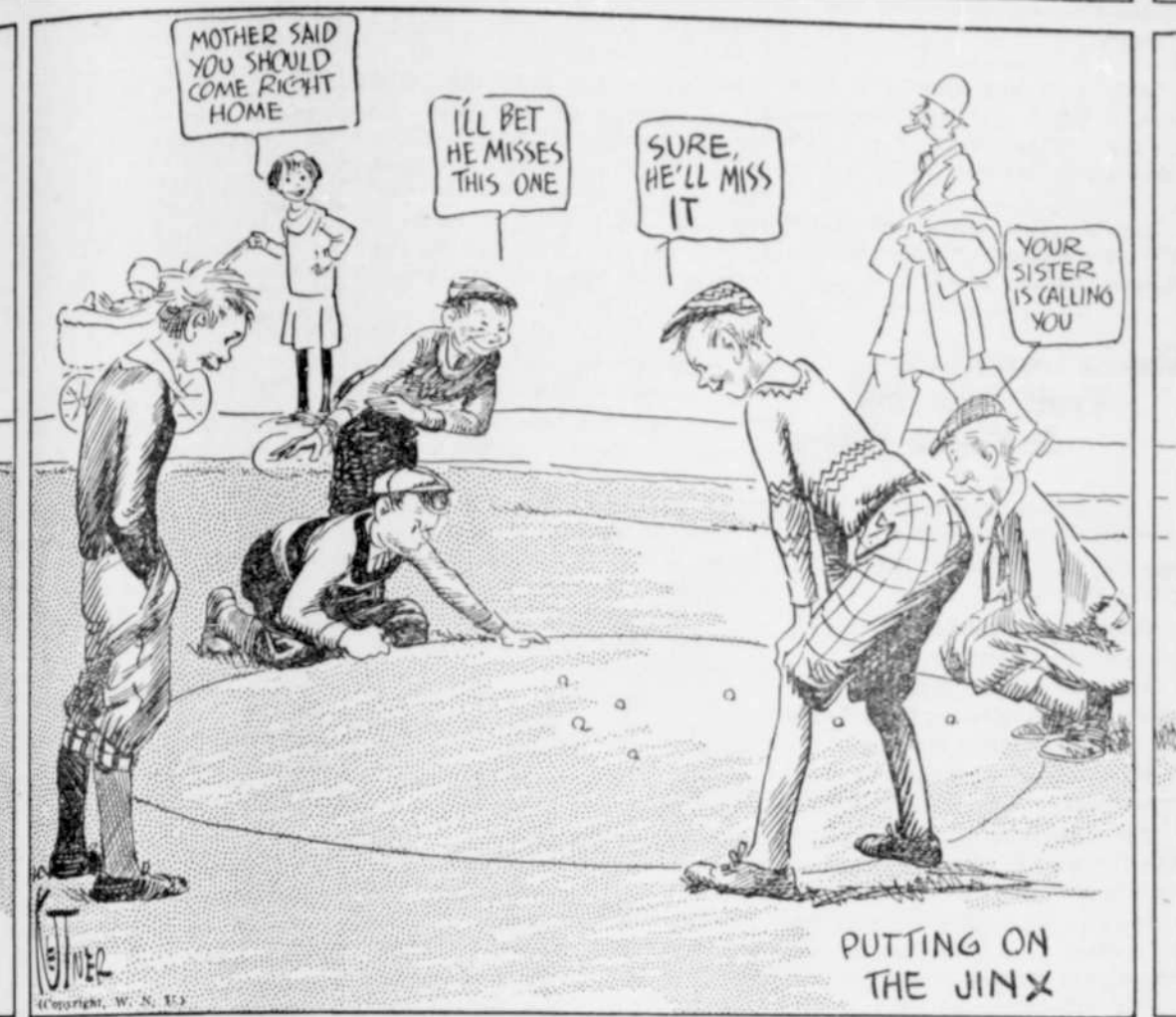

After being shut down for a short time, the Coquille Shingle Mill company expects to resume operations next week.

Ralph Mason of Ione died last week from burns from an explosion of gasoline. A spark flew into the gasoline tank while he was welding.

The city council of Astoria has repealed an ordinance licensing painters, paper-hangers and decorators and compelling them to put up a bond.

A heavy hail storm struck an area near Six Corners, stripping leaves from fruit trees. Mounds of hailstones were left in yards and on roofs.

John Cornett, who was in Redmond recently from his Ochoco ranch, said four elk had fed with his cows all winter. The elk follow the cows home each night.

Due to the copious rains the present season, a bumper crop of strawberries is anticipated in the Marshfield district. Local berries are now appearing on the market.

The Astoria chamber of commerce will undertake a campaign to sell memberships in the Oregon Coast Highway association and will have a goal of 1000 memberships.

Checks covering 30 per cent of the claims against the defunct Bank of Southwestern Oregon, at Marshfield, are ready for distribution. The amount to be distributed is \$73,523.

The Roseburg city council has set July 28 as the date for a special election to vote on the proposed annexation of Edenbower, Riverside and West Roseburg to Roseburg.

A carload of bass will be shipped by the state game commission to Klamath county to be planted in Upper Klamath lake, where it is thought conditions for their propagation are ideal.

Mayor Berg of Coquille has proclaimed May 28 a city holiday. It is the occasion of the dedication of the bridge at Gold Beach and part of the opening of the coast highway ceremony.

The McKenzie highway at the summit of the Cascades is still buried under 15 feet of snow and unless an effort is made by the highway department to open the road it will remain blocked until July.

Fruit farmers have quit telling about freakishly formed fruit and blossoms at Cove. Mrs. Hugo Blank, it is related, claims to have a sweet apple which now bears three perfectly formed double white roses.

The judges to select the queen of the Lebanon Strawberry fair will be from Willamette university. University of Oregon and Oregon State college. The choice will be based on poise, attractiveness and personality.

The bodies of Edmund C. Brown and his wife, lost in a blizzard during January in the Dead Indian country, were returned to Ashland last week. They were found by William Lindsay and William Taylor, who have searched long to determine the fate of the couple, who froze to death attempting to reach their own cabin.

Paul Aiken of Heppner received a broken ankle, a partially severed ear a deep gash on his hand and other injuries when a car which he was driving overturned on the highway on Hinton creek above town Thursday night.

Mrs. Millard Martin, wife of the Ada postmaster, was burned seriously last week at her home near Ada when the fireplace exploded from gasoline that Wesley, her five-year-old son, applied to rekindle the fire burner.

The Oregon Caves resort officially opened May 15, when regular guide service schedules were inaugurated. A large force of workmen is busy on the new hotel building, which it is hoped to have ready for use in July.

The Forcia & Larson sawmill, a mile west of Noti, will resume operations, after having been closed down for two years, it was announced. The plant is expected to operate to capacity with 50 or 55 men on the payroll.

An inch of rain fell last week in Jefferson county in 36 hours, bringing the total for May to 1½ inches. There is more moisture in the ground than at any time in the last six years and both spring and fall wheat are in excellent condition.

Sandy union high school board is completing the year without having to issue any warrant indebtedness, and expects to be able to reduce the school debt about 30 per cent next year. Salary cuts for next year average 10 per cent.

Interest in mining for gold is increasing in the Quartzville and Middle Santiam regions of Linn county, according to John Roberts, Colorado miners are taking up a placer claim on Trout creek and other newcomers are going into the hills.

While motoring between Myrtle Point and Coquille, Orvan Gant collided with a deer, making it necessary to kill the animal. Gant turned the carcass over to Deputy Game Warden C. A. Hearing, who sent it to the county farm for consumption.

Fat Elk schools were presented with the cup for the best dental record for the past year, by Mrs. Earl Smith, vice-president of the local grange, the organization having sponsored the contest. Cunningham and Roy district schools also competed.

Paul Folquet, 65, died at the wheel of the Lincoln school bus while on his regular route last week. Premonition of death was believed to have been sensed, since the car was out of gear and the ignition cut off. Several children were in the machine at the time.

The Ray-Brown cannery at Woodburn will start operations between May 25 and 30, depending upon the ripening of the strawberries of this section. A crew of about 500 will be employed to start and will increase to approximately 1000 people as the season advances.

The presentation of the pageant, "The Gateway," by the senior class, marked the close of the Ione school Clara Nelson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Nelson, was salutatorian of the class and Ralph Thompson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nicholi Thompson was valedictorian.

Snow in the Blue mountains is melting and causing the Silvies river to overflow on hay lands, as it did several years ago. Water in Malheur lake has reached almost to Pelican Island and is now running through the channel near the narrow connecting Malheur and Harney lakes.

A trip "down to the sea" from Grants Pass via a rowboat and a canoe by Andy Gigler and Tom Fithian ended abruptly when the canoe which Gigler was manipulating hit a whirlpool in Hellgate canyon, capsizing and throwing the boy into swirling water. He was able to swim out and pull the canoe ashore.

Roy I. Houck, who has the contract to gravel the 19 miles of the Port Orford-Euchre creek section of the Coast highway, has started the construction of his camp and rock crushing plant at Brushers creek where the supply of gravel will be obtained. The contract amounts to \$48,650, and is to be completed by October.

With the excavation nearly completed for the main buildings of the northwest national soldiers' home at Roseburg, construction of foundation forms has been started and concrete will be poured for footings and foundation walls within the next few days. Progress on the first unit of the veterans' home, for which the veteran administration has already appropriated \$1,300,000, has been considerably handicapped by wet weather, making excavation slow and difficult.

John Cole, an Indian, was bound over to the federal grand jury by United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas on charges of violation of the migratory bird treaty act. He was caught in possession at Klamath Falls last week, of a dead bittern, one mallard duck egg and five coot eggs. The eggs, with small birds in them, had been boiled and were ready to be eaten. An egg at that stage is considered a delicacy by Indians, Commissioner Thomas states.

The date for the annual salmon bake sponsored by the Douglas County Sportsmen's & Protective association has been changed from June 5 to June 12 to avoid conflict with other activities throughout the state by sportsmen.

A lamb show will be held in Roseburg June 4 as an attraction in connection with the national soldiers' home jubilee celebration. Cash prizes totaling \$150 have been donated by the Portland Union Stock Yards and Swift & Co.
