Mrs. Alice Finley and daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Charley Sucinley have moved into their home in Central Point from their farm.

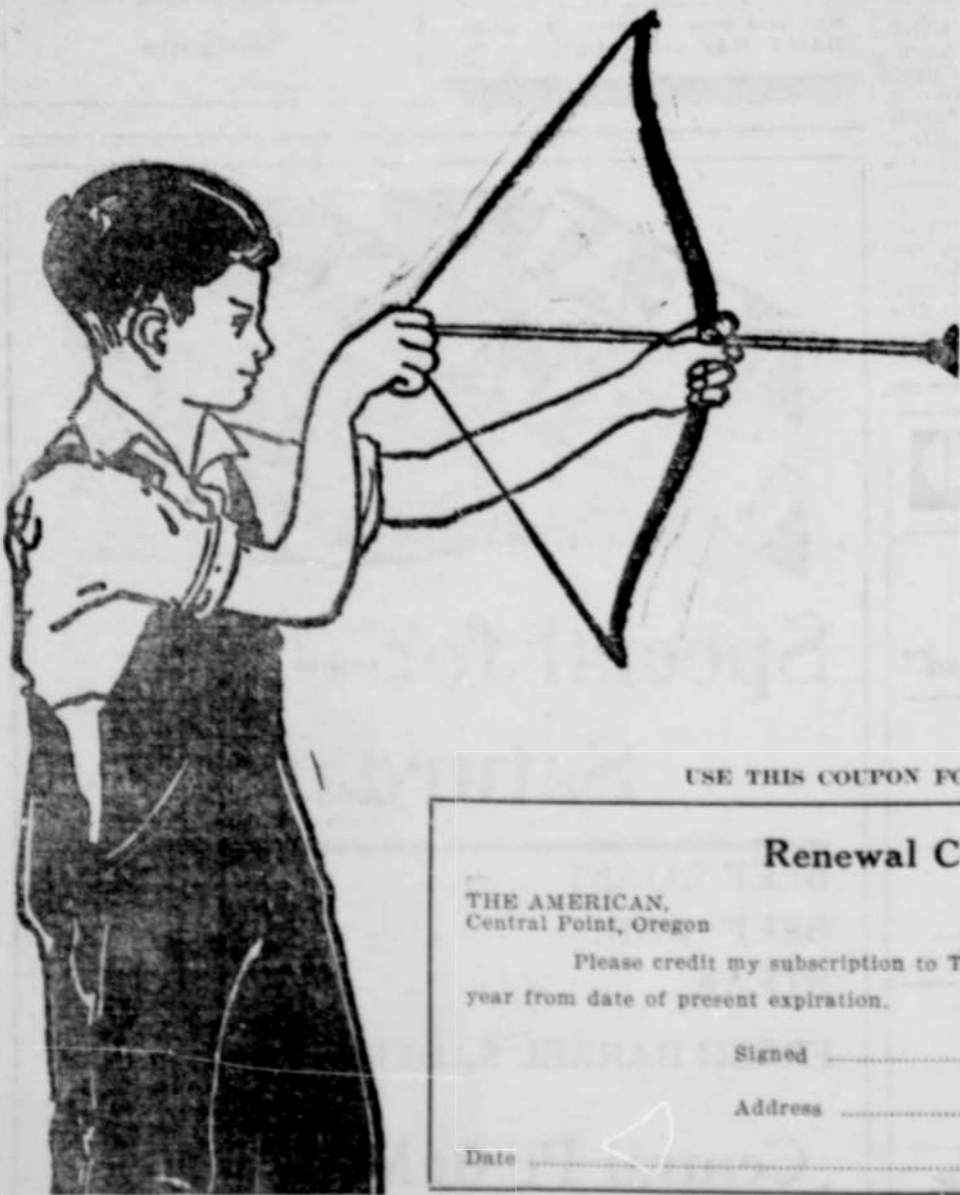
Mr. Damon has returned from Redmond, where he has been picking turkeys for the past two weeks.

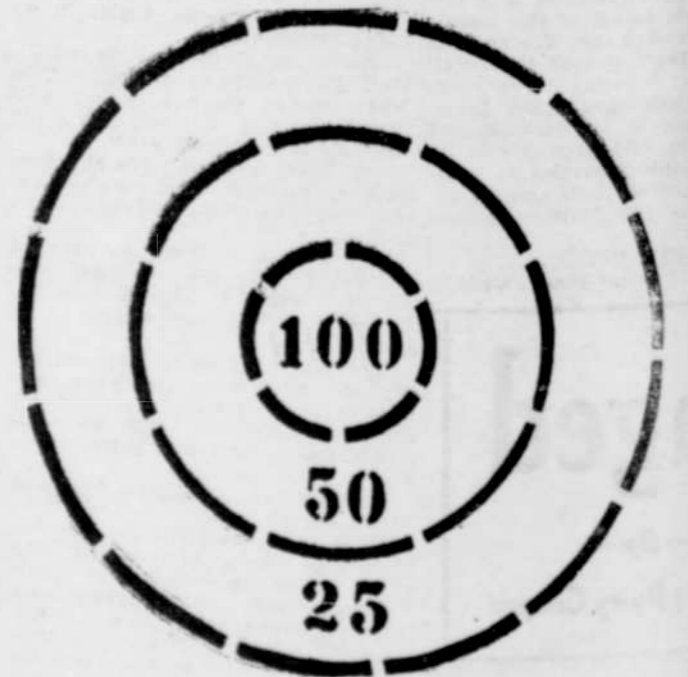
