## Two More Taken In Roundup Drive

River, and Arthur Ladieu, ex-advertising manager of the Daily News.

L. A. Banks was arrested on two indictments charging criminal libel and one indictment charging violation of the criminal syndicalism law. Leonard N. Hall is under indictment for criminal libel.

Another youth was added yesterday to the group of three being subjected to severe questioning by city and state police. These four are understood to be from the reckless coteria from the foothills known here as the "Green Spring mountain boys." Three guns and some am-tried tomorrow at 9 A. M.

A total of 23 persons are now involved in difficulty as an outgrowth of the political turmoil which has stirred this community deeply in recent weeks. Fourteen have been formally arrested, including two high county officers, two Jackson county editors and the head of an active political faction which has been warring on certain other public officials, private citizens and organizations.

Warrants have been issued for the arrest of six additional persons and four unnamed youths are being held in custody "for investigation."

Those who have been arrested for complicity in the theft of 10,000 ballots from the county vault on the eve of a recount proceedings are: T. L. Brocheen, organizer for the "Congress"; John Glenn, county jailer; C. W. Davis, county machinist; Walter Ladieu, ex-advertiser; Walter J. Jones, mayor of Rogue Junction were found in a house on Laurel street occupied by these men. A threatening communication was received presumably from them by Hall who replied with a promise of

a "Texas welcome" for any of the group who cared to visit him.

They are supposed to have been lured into the affair by a desire for excitement. From this group were recruited several of the armed guards who for several days protected the person and property of Banks. The police described them as "misguided" and quoted one youth as saying he was engaged to "defend the constitution and the News."

Police were busy searching for the other six wanted in connection with the theft of the ballots, but so far have been unable to locate any of the number. It was presumed that they had either "skipped out" or were keeping under the cover. It was also remarked that the ranks of the known agitators in the city had been noticeably thinned, presumably because of uncertainty as to whom are being sought under these outstanding warrants.

Attention has been fastened for the time being on the action of the courts on the cases of the various defendants now accused of various offenses in connection with the present community fracas. Demonstrations, inflammatory meetings and threats have practically ceased and law officers believe the crisis—so far as a possible outbreak is concerned—has been passed.

Apparently the forces of law and order have the situation in hand, backed by a determined citizenry, which is set on maintaining the good name of Medford.

The district attorney's office has been reluctant to proceed with trials until all of the defendants had been apprehended and the evidence completed. Out of the group under arrest and released on bond County Judge Fehl is stoutly demanding "immediate trial."

H. V. Schmalz, Burns attorney, arrived here today to intercede "as a friend" in behalf of the judge to get an early hearing. Fehl, stating that he is tired of "this kangaroo court" procedure, said he may retain Schmalz as counsel. John A. Jeffrey, Portland attorney, is reliably reported to have offered his services to Banks and Fehl in the cause of "free speech and justice."
