**Moving Picture of Crater Lake to Be Released Soon**

CRATER LAKE PARK, Ore.—(Special)—In the process of preparation for the past several months, a magnificent moving picture travelogue featuring scenic spots of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland, including Crater Lake, will be released for national distribution the early part of next month, according to Bruce Merman, of the Scenic Educational Film Productions of Hollywood, a visitor in the park this week. One-fourth of the 1000 foot travelogue is devoted to Crater Lake, as seen last April when snow depth was still excessive and provided rare material for color pictures, particularly bringing out the contrast between blue waters and snow-covered crater walls. Merman, accompanied by H. C. Gibbs, camera operator, of Hollywood, spent 10 days in the park taking pictures. Weather conditions were ideal. The film, destined to be shown in every portion of the United States opens with considerable footage taken in Lassen Volcanic National Park in northern California, followed by views of Mt. Shasta, the lava beds in Modoc county, of Abert Fault in Lake county—the largest exposed fault in the world—and of numerous other scenic spots.

**Fish Are Biting At Crater Lake**  
CRATER LAKE PARK, Ore.—(Special)—The whirl of the reel and the song of the line are in the air with the arrival of anglers intent on battle with Crater Lake rainbows, quite a number of which have already been caught this season. As in the past, anglers are seeking the waters near Wizard Island, where trout seem to be anxious to greet shiny spinners with vicious bites and tues. Abundantly stocked with rainbow and steelhead trout, limit catches of five per person daily are not expected to be uncommon. While trolling shall be favored during the summer, fly fishing will be much in evidence, and in past years has averaged been successful. Rowboats are available at the foot of the main wall trail, where tackle may also be rented. At the boat landing, lake excursions will be daily feature with rates half as much as they were last year.
