bound by any Code of Fair Competition approved by the president.

13. This agreement shall cease upon approval by the president of a code to which the undersigned is subject; or, if the N. R. A. so elects, upon submission of a code to which the undersigned is subject, and substitution of any of its provisions for any of the terms of this agreement.

14. It is agreed that any person who wishes to do his part in the president's reemployment drive by signing this agreement, but who asserts that some particular provision hereof, will create great and unavoidable hardship, may obtain the benefits hereof by signing this agreement and putting it into effect and then, in a petition approved by a representative trade association of his industry or other representative organization designated by N. R. A. may apply for a stay of such provision pending a summary investigation by N. R. A. if he agrees in such application to abide by the decision of such investigation. This agreement is entered into pursuant to section 4 (a) of the National Industrial Recovery Act and subjects to all the terms and conditions required by sections 7 (a) and 10 (b) of that act.
