## Buckskin Suit of Old Indian Fighter To Be on Display

John Ross is repairing an old buckskin suit of his father's, Col. John E. Ross. His father killed the deer tanned the skin cut and tailored the suit. It is a very beautiful garment with buckskin fringes on all the seams. If you look close you will see where strings of the fringe have been clipped every so often. This only goes to prove that boys in that day were no different than now.

John Ross, was an expert with a slingshot and this buckskin fringe was just right for his string. Therefore the notches in the fringe.

Col. John E. Ross made this suit in 1884 and wore it to the pioneer reunions. Mr. Ross also has a pioneer peace pipe made from a Myrtle root by a soldier at Fort Lane in 1853. This peace pipe was smoked by Gen Joseph Lane, Col. Nesmith, Col. John E. Ross, Joe and Sam and other Indians at the Table Rock treaty. The long stem has been lost.

The suit and pipe will be on display at the Jubilee headquarters in Medford.

The jury in his speedy trial acquitted him of charges of first degree murder of Ralph W. Horan, young state legislator whom Manning admitted shooting in self-defense on February 12.

The verdict was returned at 8:40 last night after the jury balloted three times. The first vote was 10 to 2 for acquittal and the second 11 to 1. The jury received the case at 4:20 p. m., and took an hour recess at dinner time.
