CITY TRUCK TO HAUL REFUSE TO DUMP GROUND

The city truck will make regular trips to the city dumping grounds. Anyone having refuse they wish to dispose of may leave orders at the city hall or with City Marshal Bert Hedgpath and the same will be called for. Cans should be sacked or boxed and placed where it will be convenient for the city truck to reach them.

A small charge of from 10c to 25c will be asked to pay the expense of operating the truck. No newspapers or magazines will be accepted and all refuse must be in fairly sanitary condition so as not to create foul smells at the dumping grounds. The best way is to burn what can be burned before calling for the truck.
