Total of 18521 Loans for July By Land Bank

Hot weather has not slowed up the staff of the Federal Land bank of Spokane in their job of making Land bank and Land Bank Commissioner's loans to farmers of the four Pacific northwest states, according to a report received today from the bank by Warren Patterson, Secretary-treasurer of the Central Point National Farm Loan association at Central Point, Oregon. A total of 1854 loans aggregating \$4,836,000 were made in July to farmers of Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

The Land bank made 562 loans on its own account amounting to \$1,921,499. Acting as agent for the Land Bank Commissioner, it made 1292 loans aggregating \$2,914,500. These commissioner's loans are made from a fund provided by Congress to help the farmer refinance his indebtedness.

Current statistics show that this money being loaned is not adding materially to the total farm debt. More than 86 per cent of all of the money loaned by the bank in the last year, acting for itself and for the Commissioner, has gone to refinance farmers' debts; that is, to pay off other mortgages, the hardware dealer, grocery store, implement concern, etc. A substantial part of it has gone to pay back taxes as well.

Loans are about evenly divided in dollar volume among the four states, Montana, Idaho and Oregon each getting more than a Million-dollar share.

county are reported to be making remarkable growth, with very few losses, according to C. A. Henderson, county agent. In addition to the grasshopper diet, they are fed large quantities of grain, and on August 1 weighed from five to eight pounds each, depending upon date of hatch. Approximately 80 per cent of the hoppers were killed by poisoning, and the turkeys are expected to control the remaining 20 per cent. There is some talk of the various owners pooling their birds for marketing this fall, Mr. Henderson says.
