

Orchardists at this time should The rate of seeding for wetch give consideration to the planting of alone is from 50 to 80 pounds per acre, while in combination with proving the orchard soll and thus ingrain the rate is from 40 to 50 pounds of vetch and 20 to 40 pounds of grain per acre. In orchards where vetch has never been grown before, seed inaculation will be necessary.




