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Nathan Durrs Brother Killed

Word was received January 6 of the death of William R. Durr, Mountain States Power Co., employe of North Bend, Ore., brother of Nathan Durr of Central Point. His body was found partially buried under the sawdust in a power plant on the Marshfield North Bend highway.

It is thought that Durr who was 32 years old, suffered a heart attack or fall and was suffocated under a slide of sawdust. An attempt at artificial resuscitation was carried on for two hours.

Durr lived here for a year, and had been employed by the power company since 1927. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Jesse Mae Durr of North Bend, four brothers besides Nathan Durr of Central Point and three sisters.
