EDITORIALS

A FUMBLE THAT BRINGS DISASTER

In an ancient religious rite, citizens stood at equal intervals, forming a chain. The one nearest the altar lighted a torch, then ran and gave it to the next, who in turn passed it on to the third, and so on. Each man ran without looking back. His sole interest was to pass on the flaming symbol.

These citizens were warned against fumbling the torch. And "Don't fumble the torch" is a good axiom to apply to modern times. The "torch" in this connection, is very small—a match—but what terrible havoc is wrought when it is fumbled. Tall buildings are razed, homes destroyed, virgin forests laid waste, and worst of all, hundreds of human lives are lost by fire every year. The toll of fire from the careless use of matches, and from smoking, in 1932 was almost \$30,000,000 according to figures compiled by the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

And yet—what a simple matter it is to be careful. The extra seconds required to make certain that butts or matches are completely extinguished are well spent when you consider what may happen if the torch is fumbled. Just place your heel on the butt and crush out every spark, or if it is a match, break it between your fingers. You fumble only when you toss them away carelessly. Don't do it!

Explains Reasons For Popularity of Electric Refrigeration

Electrical refrigeration has taken the country by storm. Mr. Smith, of Don's Radio Service in Medford explains some of the reasons for the popularity of this home appliance. The popularity of this home appliance is based on a sound foundation of fact. There are at least four definite savings made possible to the electric refrigerator owner which can be actually measured in dollars and cents. In most cases it is possible to buy one of the machines out of the savings made by its use.

First of all on the list of possible savings is quantity purchases of week end grocery specials. Research by the United States Department of Agriculture proves conclusively that 22% is the average food bill saving by taking advantage of week end bargains. The food bill for an average family of three or four amounts to forty dollars per month. Taking only half this amount or twenty dollars as the food bill and only 29% as the average saving, the amount saved is four dollars and thirty three cents per month.

Second on the list is savings on left-overs. How many times has the housewife found that food left over from one meal won't keep until she wishes to use it? Nothing to do but throw it out. Average loss from this source is five cents per meal. Some meals will run more and some less but over a period of time it will average five cents. As a specific example consider a fifteen cent can of tomatoes which equals five saucers. For many meals the family will only require two to four saucers. If the two or more portions left over are kept in an old fashioned ice box they must be eaten the next day or they will spoil. If they spoil they must be thrown out, a dead loss. Were they kept in a good electric refrigerator they could be kept several days and then combined with other left-overs to make and appetizing, tasty dish. In money, the example of canned tomatoes represents three to six cents. It is upon just such concrete examples the average figure of five cents per meal is computed. Three meals per day, thirty days per month adds to four dollars and fifty cents per month loss from spoilage.

Third on the list is the saving effected when ice deliveries are discontinued. Suppose you use ice four months out of the year. The average cost of ice per day is fifteen cents and this for four months equals eighteen dollars. If this cost is spread out over the whole year it amounts to a cost of one dol-

lar and fifty cents per month. The average cost of electricity used to run an electric refrigerator on a straight lighting rate averages one dollar and twenty five cents to one dollar and fifty cents per month. This is giving year round refrigeration instead of only four months.

In dollar and cents the average saving to be expected from the owning and operating of an electric refrigerator is eight dollars and eighty three cents per month. This amount in most instances will purchase a refrigerator on the installment plan.

Health protection is another vital function of the electric refrigerator. One illness due to contaminated food may cost more than the machine in doctor bills, medicine and loss of employment. The conveniences of the electric refrigerator are purposely omitted from our discussion as they are well known. Ice cubes at all times, salads and desserts in crisp, tasty perfection and baby's milk in perfect sanitary condition are just a few of the things the electric refrigerator adds to the pleasure of living.

Best of all the machine pays for itself in the savings it effects!
