Fifty-six picked men from the 25 Oregon camps of the Vancouver Barracks, Washington district, will arrive in Medford Saturday afternoon to await the opening of the water first aid and live saving school on Monday morning.

The two representatives from each of the 18 fifth period Medford district camps will arrive Sunday and all will be on hand to start work at the Twin Plunges in Ashland Monday.

The Ashland pool will be used each morning in practical life saving demonstrations and practice, while the students will receive class instruction at the Headquarters Detachment in Medford each afternoon. The week's work will be climaxed by a water carnival and life saving demonstrations, according to present plans.

Medford district will be host to the Vancouver Barracks district men during the week. The life saving school is one of a series being conducted on the coast under the sponsorship of the American Red Cross.

## Recruiting Started To Enlarge Army Under New Act

PORTLAND, July 12.—Under the provisions of the recently enacted National Defense Bill, the War department will increase the enlisted personnel of the Army from 118,000, to about 165,000, or an increase of some 45,000 men during the next year.

About 15,000 of this increase is expected to be effected by September by recruiting agencies of the Army at large, and to District Recruiting Officers has been allotted the big task of enlisting this large number of men within a comparatively short space of time.

Extensive plans are now under

way in the Portland Recruiting District to meet this problem, according to word received from Major H. D. Bagnall, the Army Recruiting Officer, in Portland, Oregon. The Portland office presents a busy scene these days and as a part of the expansion program, two additional recruiting sub-stations were recently established; one at Medford and the other at Pendleton, Oregon. The recruiting personnel of the District has been increased by two officers and seven non-commissioned officers in anticipation of a busy campaign. Plans are also being completed to send two recruiting parties, each party consisting of one officer and two non-commissioned officers, on state-wide canvassing tours. Approximately four months time will be spent in covering all of the towns of five hundred population and over in the states of Oregon and Southern Washington. It is planned to publish itineraries of these parties as they get under way and to post advance notices of their arrival in each town. Numerous vacancies exist in Army branches at the present time, including assignments to the 7th In-

fantry at Vancouver Barracks, Washington, 3rd Coast Artillery, Fort Stevens, Oregon, and the Chemical Warfare Service and Coast Artillery in the Philippine Islands. Vacancies for Infantry, Chiga, and 7th Infantry, Chilkoot Barracks, Alaska, are available to former service men. Inquiries regarding enlistments should be addressed to the Army Recruiting Office, 323 New Post Office Building in Portland.
