Favorite Recipes

Egyptian Nugget Cake
Dissolve 2 tablets of chocolate in 2 tablespoons hot water. Beat to cream 1/2 cup butter or substitute. Add gradually 1 1/2 cups sugar, beating all the time. Add yolks of 4 eggs. Beat. Add 1/2 cup milk, melted chocolate and 1 3/4 cups flour. Beat. Add beaten whites of 4 eggs. Stir lightly. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1 heaping teaspoon baking powder. Mix quickly and lightly. Bake in 3 layers.

Filling
2 eggs beaten separately
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1 cup whipped cream
1 cup nut meats
dash of salt
vanilla

CHOCOLATE SUNDAE PIE
1 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup water
3 egg yolks
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup sweetened whipped cream
3 egg whites, beaten stiff
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon gelatin
3 tablespoons cold water
1/4 cup grated or ground chocolate
Heat milk and 1/2 cup of water in double boiler with nutmeg. Beat egg yolks with sugar and salt until light. Pour the hot milk over the egg mixture; return to double boiler and cook until the consistency of thick cream. Remove from heat; add gelatin which has been soaking 5 minutes in cold water. Add vanilla. Cool. When cool and ready to set, beat with Dover egg beater and fold in the stiffly-beaten egg whites. Pour this mixture into baked pie shells and set away to thoroughly cool. Cover with the whipped cream and sprinkle with the chocolate.
